So he sits down on the walk and cries until someone takes him up and carries him. He is not especially tired; he simply does not care to walk.

And the strange thing is, his mother never compels him to do so; he always comes out victorious. She carries him, or his father does.

When this boy is grown and falls in life, his parents probably will blame everybody but themselves, yet they are cultivating in him daily the very qualities which will make failure inevitable.

They are allowing him to become a human jellyfish, a thing without backbone or determination, a creature who quits as soon as things become difficult or uncomfortable.

And the world is full of them. They go along well enough until the path grows rough; then they sit down and demand to be carried. They began the habit in early youth, when their mothers carried them, instead of giving them the time-honored spanking which would have made them strong.

As far as possible make them realize and appreciate those reasons. "Because I say so" is the reason of a tyrant and a weakling. Such training makes human jellyfish. Make your children walk on their own feet, decide their own problems—with your guidance—and teach them to do their own thinking, even if their thinking is different from yours.

but simply beat as you would the white of an egg. Add to three cups of pastry flour three teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Sift three times, and add to the first mixture, alternating with one cupful of milk; then add one teaspoonful of vanilla, one-fourth teaspoonful each of cinnamon and cloves, half a nutmeg, grated, and two tablespoonfuls of maraschino syrup, beating in each ingredient separately. Lastly, fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Before beginning the cake, chop one cupful of seeded raisins, and add one cupful of English currants, one-half cupful each of sliced citron and candied cherries. Dredge the fruit with a little flour reserved from the three cups, and mix it into the cake as lightly as possible. Bake in a very moderate oven for two hours.
