N.Y. CAPITOL IS TOTAL LOSS



NEW YORK'S MAGNIFICENT CAPITAL BUILDING NOW GUTTED BY FIRE.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 29.—Fire scorched and water stained, with a net loss of \$6,000,000, not including thousands of precious and irreplaceable documents, the New York state capitol today stands partly in ruins, following a seven-hours fire. The state library, with its 400,000 volumes, was destroyed. The senate and assembly chambers are smoke-blackened and water-soaked. The great western stairway, with its great architectural beauty, is blackened and its marble chipped. The western wing is flooded and the roof of the north wing is sunken.

Millions Wasted. The \$27,000,000 that has been poured into the capitol by the state for many generations has been wasted. The great building, the pride—and also the shame—of the Empire State, was planned in 1852 to cost \$1,000,000. The construction proved too tempting a chance
