Joe Smith Protests Against Booze Ring

James Morrison, the Second av. saloon man, does not like the term "slush fund," as applied in connection with the liquor interests by Joe Smith, the fighting newspaper man, in the meeting of the license committee yesterday. Smith was speaking against corporations holding liquor licenses, maintaining that they are a greater force for corruption than the individual license holders. "Violation of the law is a part of their business," said Joe. "They use their dirty money to elect crooks to office to allow them to make more dirty money, to elect more crooks. You were elected to the city council because it was felt by the people that you were opposed to this policy, and the liquor and brewing interests used their slush fund against you because they believed you would stop their violations of the law."

It was at this point Morrison interrupted with his protest against the term "slush fund."

"Mr. Green" (referring to the attorney for the brewing interests), "spoke of the law," resumed Smith. "I know that many lawyers have nothing but contempt for the law as quoted by the newspapers, and we newspapermen have nothing but contempt for the law as quoted by many lawyers."

About 50 saloon men in the council committee room took part in the discussion.

Councilman Erickson, Judge L. E. Kirkpatrick, J. W. Eflaw of the Manufacturers' association and several others spoke against giving licenses to holding corporations, while James Morrison was the chief spokesman of the saloon interests.

CONGRESSMAN IS BITTERLY SCORED

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Bitterly assailing Representative John F. Fitzgerald (democrat, New York), as the "representative in congress of the predatory interests," a letter from the American Anti-Trust League has been received by every democrat in the house.

"Behind Fitzgerald stand the Wall st. trusts, who are republicans when the republicans are in power and democrats when the democrats are in power," says the letter. "Fitzgerald takes his orders from Cannon and the trusts."

The letter demands that Fitzgerald be not named as chairman of the appropriations committee.

NEW COURT OPENS

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Hearings were commenced here today before the new commerce court. The most important case now before the tribunal is that of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co. vs. the Interstate Commerce Commission. Both class and commodity rates filed by the L. & N. from New Orleans to Memphis and other points on the system are involved.

MAY TREAT WITH BOYS' KIDNAPERS

LAS VEGAS, N. M., April 4.—No arrests have yet been made here in connection with the kidnaping of little Waldo Rogers, and it is reported that an attempt at a compromise with those who shared the \$12,000 ransom will be made and no one will be jailed.

RAILROADS WIN

WASHINGTON, April 4.—The fight of Oklahoma to prevent the Santa Fe railroad from charging higher freight rates in Oklahoma than those allowed in Kansas was dismissed by the United States supreme court today for lack of jurisdiction.

The court also dismissed Oklahoma's suit to secure an injunction preventing more than 20 roads in that state transporting intoxicants.
