TRY TO OUST HENEY FROM COMMITTEE



FRANCIS J. HENEY, Famous graft prosecutor of San Francisco who doesn't propose to be ousted from convention and will go clear through for Roosevelt.

(By United Press Leased Wire) CHICAGO, June 13.—Committee man Sturgis offered a motion before the republican national committee today providing that the proxy held by Francis J. Heney of San Francisco be rejected on the ground that Heney is a democrat. Sturgis' motion was something of a shock to Heney, who immediately took the floor to deny the accusation. The motion was tabled on a viva voce vote. Heney holds the proxy of Comman Thorsen of South Dakota.

Committee man Sturgis opened his attack on Heney immediately after the San Francisco man entered the committee room. Securing recognition from Chairman Roosevelt, Sturgis turned until he faced Heney.

"I move that this committee," shouted Sturgis, "exclude from counsel Francis J. Heney, who is a democrat, and also refuse to recognize the proxy under which he is present."

MAN PARDONED BY TAFT SUED

PORTLAND, Or., June 13.—Complaint is filed in the United States court today by United States Attorney McCourt against Willard N. Jones, recently pardoned by President Taft from serving four months in jail for land frauds, in behalf of the United States. The suit is for the recovery of \$133,000 which the government asserts is the present value of the nine entries which Jones secured by fraud. The entries entailed 1,440 acres, and were located in Coos county.

TACOMA WOMAN BURNS TO DEATH

TACOMA, June 13.—The accidental overturning of a lamp by Mrs. J. D. Perry last night caused her death by suffocation and burning. Neighbors noticed heavy smoke pouring from the windows, and notified the fire department. No one entered before the firemen, and they found Mrs. Perry lying on the bed, her clothing burned off and the flesh beginning to scorch.

SIX DROWN

NEEDLES, Cal., June 13.—Six men are believed to be drowned in the swollen Colorado river, according to messages received here today from Old Fort Mojave. The messages stated that a barge, on which six flood workers entered Bullhead canyon late yesterday, floated ashore, overturned, near the fort today.

HOLD UP DEATH

SALEM, Or., June 13.—The execution of George and Chas. Humphrey, brothers, convicted of the murder of Mrs. Eliza Griffith, scheduled for tomorrow, today has been indefinitely postponed through the serving of a stay of execution on Warden Curtis of the penitentiary. An appeal is pending before the supreme court.

WANT THAT OLD GUN

OTTAWA, Ont., June 13.—Col. Sam Hughes, minister of militia and defense, has received a request from the Bunker Hill monument association that the old gun captured at Bunker Hill in 1776 by the English and now resting on the Citadel at Quebec be returned.

FIX IT SO THEY CAN SEE CONVENTION

(By United Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, June 13.—As the result of a "gentlemen's agreement" negotiated between Majority Leader Underwood and Minority Leader Mann, in the house, and the republican and democratic leaders in the senate, it is now possible for the members of congress to attend the national conventions. The leaders agreed to suspend "partisan business" during both the Chicago and Baltimore conventions.

REFUSE TO RECEDE WASHINGTON, June 13.—By a vote of 33 to 27 the senate today refused to recede from its amendment to the metals bill repealing the Canadian reciprocity act.

AYERS PEOPLE ASK AND GET MORE DELAY

The Ayers Terminal Co. failed to come through with its proposition again, and another week's time was granted. A letter from Charles Peas to the port commission was read yesterday afternoon, in which the excuse for delay was again given that "the New York men have been unable to leave as planned," and further time was requested. Commissioner Bridges strenuously objected to these dilatory tactics, which he said was almost insulting to the port of Seattle. The Ayers people had first been notified by the commissioners to submit their proposition, if they had any, by May 27. On that day a similar excuse to the one presented yesterday was offered, and the commission agreed to wait until yesterday. Commissioners Chittenden and Rensberg voted to wait on the Harbor Island matter until next Wednesday, unless a special meeting before that should become necessary.

A BIG TIME ON THE FOURTH AT KIRKLAND

A parade will be formed in the morning, which will line up at the ferry to greet Mayor Cotterill, the speaker of the day, and after marching through the town there will be a program in the grove. The citizens are taking a great deal of interest in the approaching celebration, as are also the neighboring towns.

MASONS TO GO TO ABERDEEN

Principal business of yesterday's Masonic convention was the selection of the meeting place of the 56th annual communication of the grand lodge of F. & A. M. for next year. Aberdeen captured the convention after a short contest with North Yakima and Walla Walla.

Frank N. McCandless of Tacoma was elected grand master. A communication was read concerning the home for indigent Masons at Puyallup. While nothing definite was decided upon in the matter, it is probable that the home will be finished. The expense will be about \$25,000.

A NOBLE AFFAIR

LONDON, June 13.—One of the most brilliant of the June weddings in England was that today of Lord Northland, only son and heir of the Earl and Countess of Ranfurly, to Miss Hilda Cooper, youngest daughter of the late Sir Daniel Cooper, St. Margaret's, Westminster, was the scene of the ceremony, which was witnessed by representatives of nearly all the nobl families of the United Kingdom.

DEN RAIDED

RULING FOR PIPE LINES

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The interstate commerce commission decided today that the commerce law imposes all common-carrier obligations on all pipe lines engaged in transporting interstate commerce, even though such lines are constructed over privately acquired rights-of-way and transport only their own oil.

CHICAGO, June 13.—Fred Bugie, nominated by Indiana for republican presidential elector, announced today that he and four others from Indiana, whose names are withheld, would vote in the electoral college for Col. Roosevelt if the republicans carried Indiana.

6-YEAR-OLD BOY IS RUN DOWN BY AUTO

While playing on 16th av. yesterday afternoon, Harvey Harvey, 6-year-old son of Mrs. Peter N. Harvey, 317 17th av., was run down by an automobile driven by Albert S. Johnson, 1609 23rd av. He was taken to Providence hospital by Johnson, and this morning, after a very bad night, is in a serious condition. His injuries were for the most part internal, and he is suffering from hemorrhages.

The accident occurred in front of the home of Mrs. Samuel Brown, who says that it was not the driver's fault. E. G. Burk, who was working in Mrs. Brown's garden, and Mrs. Harth, who lives near the scene of the accident, both say that Johnson used every means to avert the accident. Johnson says that he saw the boy when half a block away, and that he slowed down to keep from hitting him. The measurements taken on the street after the accident, however, show that the car slid 93 feet before it was finally stopped.

TAFT DEFENDING COMMERCE COURT

WASHINGTON, June 13.—President Taft will veto the "budget" bill unless provision is made to continue the operation of the commerce court. This is the word coming from the White House. It is reported the president also told the house leaders he would veto the army appropriation bill unless the provision legislating Maj. Wood out of office is removed.

It is reported that President Taft declared he will stay with congress here all summer rather than agree to these two provisions.
