HOW LINDSEY LOST BEING T. R.'S MATE

DENVER, Aug. 13.—"We want Johnson," chimed at the last hour in the progressive convention by California delegates cost Judge Ben Lindsey the vice presidential nomination, according to Colorado delegates who returned home today. The nomination, the delegates declared, was in Judge Lindsey's hands just 30 minutes before Gov. Johnson was named. "Johnson all along had refused to allow the use of his name, as Californians had invited Lindsey to make the race," said one of the Colorado delegates this afternoon. "Judge Lindsey had promised to accept the nomination. Such were the circumstances when Lindsey received word that the Californians wanted Johnson and had started shouting the latter's name on the convention floor, Judge Lindsey instantly withdrew and Johnson was nominated by acclamation."

TRAGIC END OF LONG QUARREL

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 13.—As the culmination of a long series of quarrels, Otto R. Fiecht, 24, a bartender and singer, is dead here today and Mrs. Ethel Ferguson Fiecht, 23, is in jail charged with his murder. According to the woman's story, which is substantiated by witnesses, her husband abused her and backed her up against the wall in their apartment before she seized a dagger from the wall and plunged it through his heart.

The secretary will sail from Seattle on the United States cruiser Maryland and will reach Yokohama September 16. He will start on his return voyage September 20 and will arrive in the United States about the middle of October.

SEATTLE WOMAN WANTS NEW \$ FOR OLD ONE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 13.—"Recently I have acquired two daughters, and in view of the steadily diminishing power of the dollar I'd like to get something for it, while a dollar is still worth 30 cents." This was the note accompanying a very much mutilated dollar certificate received at the treasury department today for redemption from a woman in Seattle. She explained that the bill was torn six years ago when "a dollar looked no bigger than a dime," and she put it away.

Taft Saves Negress Convicted of Murder
WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—President Taft announced this afternoon that he would commute to life imprisonment the death sentence imposed on Mattie Loman, a negress convicted of the murder here of her husband. She was the first woman to be held in the District of Columbia under a death sentence since the case of Mrs. Surratt, who was involved in the conspiracy against Abraham Lincoln.

"GO AWAY, IT'S FUN TO DIE" HE YELLS

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Grinning insanely as the flames he had started in his cell licked his face, body and hands, Jacob Guthrie, the man who stole \$300,000 worth of merchandise "just for the fun of stealing" was saved from death here by six turnkeys after a terrific fight. Guthrie attracted the attention of other prisoners by shouts of laughter after he had set fire to his clothing. When the turnkeys attempted to extinguish the flames he fought with the strength of a maniac. "Go away, you idiots," he shouted. "It's fun to die. Go away and let me alone."

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—Appealing to women here to make use of their right to the ballot, Archbishop Patrick W. Riordan, in a letter addressed to the pastors of the various churches in his diocese, urged that the matter be called to the attention of the congregation. Archbishop Riordan strongly advocated the necessity of women taking advantage of their right to vote and compared civic responsibility with religious responsibility.

TEDDY WILL MAKE TOUR OF 40 STATES

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 13.—Declaring emphatically that he would not resign his office, Gov. Hiram Johnson is preparing today for the big mass meeting to be held tonight, at which he will be the principal speaker. The 12 other members of the California delegation returning from the Chicago progressive convention declared they had consented to Gov. Johnson's nomination for the vice presidency on condition that he should not resign. The governor brings word that Roosevelt will campaign in 40 states, taking the stump in one part of the country while Johnson is speaking in another.

RENO, Nev., Aug. 13.—After leaving a trail of worthless checks along the Pacific coast, principally in Los Angeles and San Francisco, Murray Schwabe, alias Morris Schwin, will be taken to San Francisco today on an extradition warrant. One of Schwabe's victims was a member of the San Francisco grand jury.
