

MOST DRAMATIC EFFORT IN ORATORY OF ATTORNEY'S CAREER

(By United Press Teased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, Aug. 15.—His face streaming tears, the jury which is to decide whether he shall go to the penitentiary or be a free man weeping like children, and with not a dry eye in the crowded court room, Clarence S. Darrow today placed his fate in the hands of the 12 men who will deliberate on their verdict within a few short hours.

The famed attorney made the greatest oratorical effort of his long career. He played on the feelings of the jury and his audience as a master touches the keys of a great organ.

"If you 12 men send me to the penitentiary—I'll go," said Darrow. "Life is like a game of whist. The unseen cards are shuffled and dealt by the hands of Fate. I don't like the way the cards are shuffled, but I like the game."

"I'll play the game through the long, long night with the cards I'm dealt until the breaking of day. Gentlemen, thousands of men, women and children, deep down in the mines, in the stores, the shops and the railroads, on iron frames and in the bowels of the steamships—are looking to you to save me, and to vindicate my name."

"They are looking to you gentlemen, and they'll thank you," will fool with my liberty. Darrow's speech was rapid and emphatic. He seemed more sure of himself, more bold and confident than the yesterday.

"When do you trust Franklin's statements—when he was first arrested, or when they had him by the throat and said to him: 'Here is the penitentiary on one side and liberty on the other?'"

"That's the excuse Franklin gave for not stealing the money. Hood is a liar—all liars," growled Darrow with biting sarcasm.

"Franklin only Pure Man" "Ford says I corrupted LeCompte Davis. Davis is a full-grown man. He's a lawyer of experience. He can take care of himself. And, gentlemen, all these people lied. Franklin is the only pure and innocent man in the case. Franklin, a self-confessed liar and a man who bribed jurors for \$1,000 a shot."

"I took \$4,000 from Job Harriman and gave it to Franklin and told him to trot down to Third and Los Angeles streets, as near my office as he could get, and buy a juror. Like one of you would hand your child a penny and tell him to run down to the corner grocery and buy a stick of candy."

"I'm not blaming Franklin. He's not responsible for his brain," Darrow went on. "But think of the detectives they set on me. Think as the lice of Egypt. Nine testified in this case."
