EIGHT-YEAR-OLD BOYS ARE HOLD-UPS

JOPLIN, Mo., Sept. 12.—Earl Hurst and Frank McDonald, each 8 years old, will be brought to Joplin from Carthage for trial tomorrow in juvenile court on charges of highway robbery. The boys, according to the police, have confessed to four holdups.

Robert Saylor, 6 years old, of Carthage, is said to have been three times the victim of the boys. Miss Mary Doris, who resides near Carthage, also was robbed. The boys admit having watched their child victim make purchases at a business house and receive some change. They followed him, and within two blocks of the public square held him up and took the money.

Miss Doris was followed in an open buggy on one of the principal streets of Carthage when she was robbed. Her purse lay in the seat. One of the boys is said to have grabbed it and ran. A total of more than \$14 was obtained in the four robberies. Part of this was spent for a rifle, two slungshots and some food.

SAYS CHAUFFEUR WAS SPEEDING

That Chauffeur F. W. Fuller, who ran down little Vivian Hedstrom, aged 5, at 24th av. and Madison st. Monday, which later caused the death of the child, was speeding at the time of the accident, is the charge of the dead girl's father. Hedstrom also says that Fuller did not take the injured girl to the hospital in his auto as was reported.

BAYREUTH SEATS HIGH

BERLIN, Sept. 12.—The public and press alike are indignant at the exorbitant prices which are being quoted for seats at the Bayreuth Wagnerian performance. So great has been the outcry that the local magistracy has interfered and police intervention is expected.

Third-row seats in the side gallery fetch \$6, two stalls are sold for \$45, and \$6 seats are fetching \$63. One American visitor paid \$450 for a 25 series ticket.

This extravagant gambling is largely due to the Parsifal monopoly, about which the press is making a great outcry. The promoters of the Bayreuth season, however, say that they have no knowledge of any ticket trafficking, which is absolutely irregular, as an agreement that every original purchaser has to sign, prohibits its subsequent sellings or transfers.

JAKY WANTS INJUNCTION ON MINERS

The striking coal miners of Jakey Purth's coal mines at Renton have been cited to appear before Judge Cushman Friday to show cause why they should not be enjoined from picketing the mines. The miners are fighting for the life of their union, the Renton mines being the only ones in the state where the union is not recognized.

The company tried to get Bob Hodges to appoint some of its representatives as special deputies to preserve order, but Hodges, after an investigation, not only refused but fired two Renton deputies who were disposed to take orders from the company. Hodges made a speech to the miners, urging them to maintain order and this they have done.

AIR FLEET WILL REVOLUTIONIZE WAR

ALDERSHOT, Eng., Sept. 12.—Judging from results shown at the British military maneuvers now being conducted here, a great triumph for the air fleet is apparent, and future warfare will be revolutionized without doubt.

Military experts declare the height and speed attained by the aerial fleet incalculable, with the result that the worth of the fleet would be indeterminate in time of war.

BLAMES PEOPLE FOR "MONEY TRUST"

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 12.—"The money trust is a myth" was the gist of an address delivered here today before the Trust company section of the Bankers' association convention by Geo. M. Reynolds, head of the Continental and Commercial Bank of Chicago.

"Whatever there is of concentrated power," Reynolds said, "exists because of the national banking laws. The bankers wanted to amend the laws and diffuse the money power more widely through the country, but the people would not permit it."

PAWED BY MAD HORSE

WORKING WOMEN GAIN

PARIS, Sept. 12.—According to statistics just published, 17,000 more men are at work in France now than five years ago, the figures for women having increased more than 850,000 in the same length of time. In 222 professions women are in the majority, while in the total they represent 35 per cent. In the ditch digging and stone working trades women have 1,754 members.

TIPTON, Ga., Sept. 12.—Fast asleep, Paul Inman, 12 years old, walked from a swiftly-moving Atlantic Coast Line train here and the shock of the fall failed to awaken the lad. He did not know of the peril he had survived until he was aroused by a party of searchers. He bore no bruises.
