PROPOSE LAW TO STERILIZE DEGENERATE

By United Press Leased Wire. SALEM, Or., Jan. 16.—The sterilization bill has been introduced in the legislature by Representative L. G. Llewelling of Albany. Dr. Owens Adair of Portland, foremost among advocates of this method of handling the criminally degenerate, is here in behalf of the measure, which provides that the superintendent of the state insane asylum, institution for feeble minded, Eastern Oregon hospital, state penitentiary shall report quarterly to the state board of health the records of all habitual criminals and moral degenerates, and that after an investigation the state board may order "such surgical operation upon the said inmate as, in the opinion of the state board of health, may be necessary for the protection of the peace and safety of the state."

THEY'RE TRYING TO DEPORT PRETTY MISS OF NINE AS AN "UNDESIRABLE ALIEN"

The problem was too difficult for the police to solve, so they referred it to the humane and juvenile department. That department puzzled over it, and passed it on to the juvenile court. The juvenile court racked its brains for a solution, and, finding none, asked Judge Frater to try. Judge Frater spent a day and a half hearing both sides of the story, and he doesn't know now what ought to be done. Then the immigration authorities stepped in. Can a 9-year-old girl be an "undesirable alien"? A healthy, happy, pretty, well-mannered and exceptionally well-educated little girl of nine? Her name is Edith Bycroft. She was born in Yarmouth, England. Back there her father was a bookmaker, following the races. He married a Yarmouth widow, reputed to be wealthy. "SPEAKS 'PIECES' IN SALOON. The family moved to Canada and thence to Seattle. They lived at the Hotel Regina. Now, the Hotel Regina is "below the line." It is owned by the brothers Clancy—John and Frank—who also own the Detroit Bar, in the same building, and who were a few years ago a power to be reckoned with politically. Trouble arose between Edith's father and mother. The stories told are contradictory. The woman was arrested for drunkenness and the case was dismissed. She said her husband was a gambler and a spendthrift. Meanwhile the daughter, it is said, had the run of the hotel and saloon. The patrons of the brothers Clancy, it was charged, liked to see her dance, and applauded and rewarded her when she "spoke pieces." And so, "after a time, Edith fell into the toils of the law." "A case for deportation," said Judge Frater, and the Bycrofts were turned over to the immigration authorities. But the daughter was given temporarily to the charge of Frank Clancy, bachelor. "Nicer little girl you ever saw," said Bachelor Clancy today. "Smart as a whip, believe me. I saw the hotel wasn't any place for her, so I've got her out at John's house. John's married, and he has as fine a home as anybody could wish. Nothing's too good for that youngster."

SCORES FLEE TO HILLS AS RIVER RISES

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Jan. 16.—Braving the treacherous currents of the swollen Ohio river, a relief boat arrived here today from Calhoun, Ky., and reported that 250 families, living in groups of six to ten families to a house in the hills, were starving. They had been without food for three days, said the captain of the steamer. The Evansville relief boat put out for Calhoun with food and provisions. The high water is over the main line tracks of the Illinois Central and the Louisville and Nashville railroads and announcement of abandonment of traffic over those lines was expected. Never before have all electric roads been blocked by the floods. The Ohio river stage this morning was 46.4 feet here. It was rising steadily. Rain was falling. If 47.9 feet is reached, as predicted, the city will experience the worst flood in its history and the surrounding country is sure to suffer millions of dollars of property loss. A man on a raft passed here late yesterday. He shouted for help, but there was no boat around big enough to brave the swift river current. He is supposed to have been drowned.

TAYLOR THROWS OFF MASK; 'YOU'RE ON WRONG SIDE,' HE TELLS ANGRY PROGRESSIVE

OLYMPIA, Jan. 16.—Governor Taylor at the capital Wednesday produced a soothing influence on the house membership during the morning session, when the high-strung atmosphere pervading it during the first two days changed to a dead calm during the joint session of the house and senate, as the solons submitted themselves to the prosaic duty of listening to ex-Gov. Hay's swan song. Even Taylor's committee announcements failed to strike fire, although the standpat line-up of the two old parties was further accentuated by allowing 12 chairmanships among the 18 democrats, no chairmanships to either of the women in the house, and two minor chairmanships to the progressives. But in the afternoon, when the patronage committee made its report, things started to hum again. Representative Murphree of King wanted to know why Speaker Taylor was allowed \$5 extra per day, when the constitution fixed the salaries of representatives at only \$5 per diem. M. Neumann of Spokane demanded an explanation why clerkship recommended by nine out of ten Spokane solons was disregarded, in preference to A. M. Stevens, the progressive from that county who had deserted. Representative Sims, the reactionary whip, hemmed and hawed in his explanation, so that when Representative Earle of King, another bull mooser, asked why the unanimous recommendation of his particular district was ignored, Speaker Taylor bluntly replied: "Plainly speaking, you're on the wrong side of the fence." And, while some standpaters and democrats applauded the answer out of loyalty to the speaker, the progressives contributed part of the applause because they had compelled Taylor to throw off any masquerade as to his declaration of non-partisanship, which he had made on taking the chair the first day. Representative Wm. Wray, who Taylor appointed chairman of the judiciary committee, came to Taylor's rescue on the additional 50-day proposition by declaring that the house owed it to the "dignity of the speaker" to give him more of a salary than that of the chief clerk, whose compensation was fixed at \$7.50. There were 43 bills introduced in the house when it adjourned Wednesday evening, on account of the governor's ball, till 1 p. m. today.

MANAGER OF BANK DENIES CHARGES

J. P. Gleason, former manager of the American Savings Bank and Trust Co., made a general denial Wednesday of the charges preferred against him by Vice President Michael Earles. Gleason filed an affidavit in the superior court, claiming his management of the bank had raised its stock to a value of \$400 a share. Judge Albertson will conduct, Friday, a hearing on the difference of opinions between Earles and Gleason.
