John W. Considerine, the theatrical magnate, returned from San Francisco last evening and today made the following statement to The Star, relative to the case against him, which was dismissed yesterday:





### 58 DIE WHEN CRUISER RAMS TORPEDO BOAT, IN NIGHT NAVAL MANEUVERS

HAMBURG, March 5.—Blotting out 58 or more lives, the German cruiser York rammed the German torpedo boat "S 173" during night maneuvers off Heligoland, the smaller craft sinking immediately. Only 15 members of the crew of 85 on the torpedo boat have been accounted for and the remainder are dead or missing.

### BALK EFFORT TO BURY A PEOPLE'S MEASURE

OLYMPIA, March 5.—To Rep. Thomas F. Murphine of Seattle, progressive, is due the credit for the lease of life enjoyed today by the bill submitting to the voters the right of the people to initiate constitutional amendments.

Advocates of the measure, which was strongly championed by Frank Middaugh, Tom Corkery, E. K. Brown and Murphine, progressives, and Goss, republican, secured a decided majority of the house, but were a few votes shy of the necessary two-thirds to submit a constitutional amendment.

On three votes aimed against the bill, the progressives won out handily. The amendment by Rep. Farnsworth, democrat, to require a majority of all votes cast at an election, was also defeated. The progressive then mustered 64 votes to 29 to bring the measure to a final vote.

GORIN, Mo., March 5.—Curvature of the spine is given as the cause of the death of Miss Ella Ewing, the world's tallest woman and noted circus sideshow character. She died at the home of her father, a farmer, living near Gorin.

Miss Ewing was 8 feet 1 1/2 inches in height and would probably have been much taller had it not been for the disease which caused her death and which she contracted several years ago, before she had attained her full height.

### BATTLESHIP FILIBUSTER JARS BORDEN REGIME IN CANADA; ASK ELECTION

OTTAWA, Ont., March 5.—Battling for its official life, the government of Premier Sir Robert Borden still held firm today, the third of a continuous session of the Dominion parliament, in which the liberal opposition, led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, seeks to force a general election on the question of whether aid to the British navy shall be in Canadian-built and manned battleships or in cash.
