CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico, March 8.—I have just come from an interview with the terrible "black angel of Mexico!"

With Gen. Luis Terrazas, the weazened, dome-headed, fish-eyed Mephistopheles of this republic—THE man most of all, as I hear it, responsible for soaking these hot sands of throbbing Mexico with the blood of his countrymen again and again, just so that he, grasping and inhuman, may get more and more power, while the common people shall grow poorer and poorer, more crushed and more crushed!
