SURVIVOR OF 'JAYHAWKER' CARAVAN DIES; AGED 99

STOCKTON, Cal., May 27.—break a trail to connect with the old Santa Fe trail. At Little Salt Lake, 250 miles south, the party got hold of one of Fremont's maps and, against the wishes of Capt. GRAND JURY HEARS ABOUT \$6,100 THAT IS MISSING

Mrs. James Gillespie is trying to convince the grand jury that \$6,100 in currency was being carried by her husband when the latter was killed by a train on Railroad av. last October, and that it mysteriously disappeared after his body was taken in charge by the coroner and undertaker. Witnesses produced by the widow were examined yesterday in an effort to show how her husband had sold certain property in Colorado, deposited the money here and later drawn it out. She told of the unusual attentions that were showered upon her after her husband's death, but later the coroner made an accounting, turning over to her only \$1, which he said was found on the body, and she was presented with a large bill for funeral expenses.

BRITISH NAVY MAN IN CELL CRIES TRICKERY

BURLINGAME, Cal., May 27.—J. G. Gunn, a former officer in the British navy, is waiting trial today, on a charge of passing a worthless check. He was arrested at the instance of H. G. Mays, a real estate dealer, who charges Gunn gave him a check for \$1,450, which was returned, marked "No funds." "I came to Burlingame to see friends," Gunn said today, "and sought March 5 last. An Englishman, for directions. We became friends and he urged me to buy some land. I told him I would have to wait until my folks in Glasgow sent me money. Then he suggested I put up a check, which he promised not to cash until the money arrived. Under this agreement, I issued the check."

HAIGHT NEW PRESIDENT OF MUNICIPAL LEAGUE

James A. Haight, lawyer, was elected president of the Municipal League for the ensuing year. The annual meeting was held at the Commercial club rooms Monday night, and was attended by approximately 200 members. Mayor Cotterill made a brief address, commending the work of the league. The league went on record as favoring the East waterway, and passed a resolution pledging support to the port commission's comprehensive plan. Retiring President O. B. Thorngrimson and Secretary Clancy M. Lewis gave their annual reports, which showed that the league has grown to a membership of about 1,100.

INSPECTOR SURRENDERS; WIFE ACCOMPANIES HIM

Interesting developments are expected with the voluntary return of Neil MacArthur, the customs inspector, who disappeared suddenly just prior to the trial of Charlie Louie and James A. Ralston, who were recently acquitted here of opium smuggling conspiracy. Following MacArthur's reappearance came the arrest of Charlie Louie on a second charge, by which he is jointly accused with MacArthur of having "received, concealed and facilitated the transportation of 148 tins of opium" from Portland, Or., on March 5 last. Both were taken before U. S. Commissioner Totten. Louie was placed under \$2,500 bail. Ralston was committed to jail upon failing to furnish \$3,000 bonds. MacArthur was accompanied by his wife, whom he recently married. When he went to the federal building to deliver himself to Special Agent of the Treasury Channing.

WILSON STILL ON TRAIL OF A CURRENCY REFORM

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Currency reform and the personnel of the new industrial commission were the principal matters discussed at the cabinet meeting. No agreement on a currency bill was reached, but it is expected the measure will be introduced next week. President Wilson is scheduled to confer tonight with Chairman Glass of the house banking committee. Later he will confer with the senate banking committee, hoping to get universal support for the bill. The industrial commission nominations are expected to be sent to the senate this week.

CITY STARTS MOVEMENT TO OBTAIN POWER SITE

To enlarge the power facilities of the city, Councilman Erickson, champion of municipal ownership in the council, introduced a bill Monday, which will permit the city to initiate condemnation proceedings to acquire the Lake Cushman site. The measure was referred to the committee of the whole. At the general election in 1912 the people authorized the council, if it saw fit, to spend \$640,000 for the purchase of this site.
