MUTTON! BROILING, FRYING AND ROASTING; RECIPES PREPARED BY UNCLE SAM

In broiling things, you see them quickly over a clear fire to keep in the delectable juices. If the meat lacks fat, smear fat at once over it. In "pan broiling" you use a very hot pan, lightly greased. Chops from the loin or rib, cutlets from the leg or thick pieces from partially boiled or roasted mutton are suitable for broiling.

Broiled Loin Chops Remove superfluous fat and roll the flank about the tenderloin, fastening it with skewers. Place on a broiler greased with some of the mutton fat. Cook from six to eight minutes, turning frequently during the first part of the time.

A sauce of butter, to which a little lemon juice and chopped parsley have been added, is sometimes rubbed over the chops, or since the chops themselves contain much fat, lemon juice and parsley only may be used, or the chops may be served on this sauce of lemon.

Savory Sauce To the fat in the pan in which chops have been broiled—if you broil 'em that way—add enough butter to make about two tablespoons. In this brown three tablespoons of flour and add one cup of water or stock. Season with salt and pepper and add one-half onion, finely chopped, and one tablespoon each of capers and finely chopped pickle.

Roasting mutton is cooking it with dry heat, so you've got to be especially careful to keep the juices from escaping if you want to retain the flavor. The oven should be very hot until the meat is thoroughly seared. It then the temperature should be reduced and the fat dripping from the meat should be frequently poured over it.

Roast Leg o' Mutton.

The best thing about roast mutton is MINT SAUCE. So let us take that first. Mix 1/4 cup of finely chopped mint leaves (fresh or dried) with 1 tablespoon of powdered sugar, half a cup of vinegar and a half a teaspoonful of salt. Let the mixture stand in a warm place until the flavor of the mint has soaked into the liquid. The soaking process can be hastened by boiling the vinegar and sugar, then adding the mint and salt.

As for the meat, just sprinkle it with salt and roast it on a rack in the roasting pan, dredge it with flour, stick into the aforesaid hot oven, and baste it, baste it, baste it. If you want it well done allow 15 minutes to a pound.

For stuffed leg o' mutton have the leg cut in two and use the thicker end. Remove the bone, replace it with any sort of dressing desired and tie up into presentable shape.

Brown Gravy.

In making gravy for roast mutton allow 2 level tablespoons of fat for each cup of gravy desired, pouring off any excess of this amount. To the fat add 3 tablespoons of flour and cook thoroughly, browning it, but being very careful not to burn it. Add boiling water or broth and boil for a short time, stirring constantly. Add salt and pepper. The proportions are 2 tablespoons of fat, 3 tablespoons of flour, and 1 cup of water or stock. If the flour is not browned, only 2 level tablespoons are needed for each cup.

Baked Brest.

Sew up a breast of mutton in a very thin cloth, put it into a steppan, pour over it enough cold salted water to nearly cover it, and let it simmer, allowing 10 minutes to each pound. Then take it out of the steppan and out of the cloth, put it in a baking dish, rub it over with mutton drippings, butter, or savory fat, sprinkle some flour over it and bake for one-half hour in a hot oven, basting frequently with its own broth. Five minutes before taking it out of the oven strewn fine dry bread crumbs thickly over it, put little bits of butter here and there, and let it brown. Serve with a brown sauce made from the broth in which the meat was cooked.


POSTPONE ROSE SHOW ONE WEEK
