

## BARES CONSPIRACY FOR \$5,000,000 STEAL IN PLAN FOR HARBOR TERMINALS

That the Ayers crowd is pushing the proposition to increase the port commission to five members in order to force the location of the terminals on the northeast end of Harbor Island is the open charge made by President Pardee of the Municipal league.

"And that would mean nothing but a big real estate graft, as the Ayers scheme was meant to be from the very start," he said. "The map explains the situation. If the terminals are located on the northeast or northwest end of Harbor Island, the only accessible property within one mile of the terminals will be on Harbor Island alone, shutting off the rest of Seattle, and thus enhancing the value of Harbor Island probably some \$5,000,000."

We, the South Seattle improvement club, are heartily in and 5.


We are unalterably opposed to Proposition 4.

## THE 'QUEER' THING AT HARBOR ISLAND



Harbor Island is owned, either directly or through foreclosure mortgages, by N. H. Lattimer, C. B. Bussell, J. M. Frink, and other Chamber of Commerce members, who have been strenuously asking for an increase in the port commission.

At first, the Ayers plans contemplated locating the terminals on the northwest corner of the island. Now, however, since the people will undoubtedly vote to cancel the Harbor Island bonds for \$5,000,000, and substitute the \$5,000,000 bond issue for the "East" waterway terminals, the Harbor Island crowd is looking with hope upon an increased membership of the port commission. For the northeast side of Harbor Island is bounded by the East waterway, and, therefore, would come within the scope of the \$5,000,000 bond issue.

A joint report of the Commercial club, the Municipal league, and the Public Ownership league has been prepared, which recommends an affirmative vote at the coming election in June for Propositions 1, 2, 3 and 5, and a negative vote against Proposition 4, which is the proposition to increase the port commission.

## BOMB WOUNDS MANY IN LISBON

LISBON, June 12.—Following a disturbance here last night, a bomb was thrown from the upper window of a house into a municipal parade today. Many persons are known to have been wounded, and it is reported several were killed. The reports of fatalities have not been verified.

## HERE'S THE MOST CURIOUS GAS ENGINE IN THE WORLD

The most curious of all gasoline motors has recently been brought out in Paris and was exhibited there at the aviation show. The pistons, four in number, are placed at the ends of long arms and look like the letter X. They swing alternately together and apart, as the gas is introduced in the cylinder, the latter revolving around them at high speed from the effects of these impulses, while the arms themselves swing at a slightly slower speed in a continuous revolution.

Only one spark plug is used with this engine and the fuel consumption is extremely low. The four operations of the internal combustion engine, suction, compression, explosion and exhaust, are carried on in a regular cycle of actual motions. The charge is introduced simultaneously, or practically so, because of the rapid revolution of the cylinder, between the pistons at opposite sides of the cylinder, the explosion forcing them apart like scissors, to meet another charge introduced between them as they come together. The motor attains a speed of 1,600 revolutions, delivering 60 h. p. and yet weighs but 209 pounds, or 2 1/2 per h. lb.
