Grant, fruit seller, was chosen as the nominee. The recommendation that Grant be appointed was sent to Pres. Wilson today. Grant won over his only opponent, Leonard Talbot, 60 to 50.

Lister and members of the State Highway commission are expected here Friday or Saturday to inspect the Lewis and Clarkton Interstate bridge, which the states will take over and operate free after July 1. The bridge, which is now a toll institution, was ordered purchased at the last sessions of the Idaho and Washington legislatures. Each state will pay \$40,000.

UNCLE SAM PREPARES TO GIVE GETTYSBURG VETS GOOD TIME

War Department Makes Lavish Arrangements to Entertain Union and Confederate Soldiers on Historic Battlefield.

GETTYSBURG, Pa., June 12.—The Battle of Gettysburg, the greatest in American history, is to be re-fought, but in memory this time, not with bullets.

Among the famous people expected to attend are Gen. "Dan" Sickles, who lost his leg at Gettysburg; Mrs. La Salle Corbell Pickett, widow of the famous Gen. George Edward Pickett, whose charge was the most thrilling event in the three days' fighting; Gen. Nelson A. Miles, who was a lieutenant at Gettysburg; Lindsey M. Garrison, secretary of war, and Gen. Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the army.

DRIVE PINOS OUT AT POINT OF BAYONET

By United Press Special Wire. MANILA, June 12.—Six American troopers were killed and 12 wounded in a desperate encounter at Bagnag with Moros, under the sultan of Jolo, according to reports from the scene of battle received here. No estimate of the Moro loss is given.

Under the personal command of Brig. Gen. Pershing, the American punitive force attacked the Moro lines today, and after a desperate hand-to-hand fight, captured the entrenched Moros.

The sultan of Jolo long has refused to acknowledge American authority, and after a long series of outbreaks, it has been decided to stamp out his resistance. It is not certain whether the battle of Gagsag has been entirely finished, the message being somewhat obscure.

Baking Helps

Learn to Regulate the Heat of Your Oven

There is just one way to make your cakes rise high and keep an even surface. Have your oven moderate at first, until the cake is fully risen; then increase the heat, so as to brown it over quickly. Extreme heat stiffens the dough. If you stiffen the outside of the cake before the rising is complete, you stop the rising process.

Note—Biscuits or other pastries made from stiff dough, that are cut into shapes for the oven, bake in a hot oven. This is because the cut surfaces of the dough do not seal over, but rather leave the pores open, allowing the leavening gas to escape and the heat to penetrate readily. Small ovens cool quickly; therefore they should be made several degrees hotter than a larger oven, and the less the door is opened the better. Do not attempt to bake bread and pastry together. Bread requires prolonged, moderate baking—pastry the reverse.

Have a strong underheat for baking powder preparations, especially pastry. These are only a few of the many baking helps found in the K. C.
