### GERMANY IS BACK OF JAPS, SAYS SPY

NEW YORK, June 13.—Dr. Armgaard Carl Graves, former confidential agent of the German government and later of the British government, has been released from prison and is in New York. Dr. Graves was convicted in Edinburgh, Scotland, for having plans of big guns at Edinburgh and memoranda of a diplomatic code. He was sentenced to imprisonment for 18 months. He declares he was offered his release if he would consent to enter the British secret service. Consenting, he was freed. Dr. Graves said: "Germany sanctions and will not obstruct Japan in any colonizing intention Japan entertains as regards the Far East." Dr. Graves has left the British service, he says, because, after using him to its advantage, it has refused to pay him a promised reward.

### OUT OF PRISON; FACES GALLOWS

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., June 13.—Frank Gordon, whose correct name is Walter Barnes, was arrested here today as he emerged from prison after a three-years sentence and will be taken to Chicago to stand trial for the murder of his wife and her sister, when they refused to give him money. Before Barnes' imprisonment he was prominent in vaudeville. He was captured in Oklahoma after the murders, but was sent to Leavenworth for forgery, evidence of the alleged murders not then being available.

### 500 MILLION IS ONLY RESERVE

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Denial of reports that market conditions prompted him to tell the national banks of the country that he was prepared to issue \$500,000,000 of emergency currency was voiced here today by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo. "For some time," said McAdoo, "inquiries have been received from banks as to whether the treasury department is prepared to issue such currency. I merely answered these questions publicly. The fact that the statement was issued at a time when the market was suffering from depression was merely a coincidence."

### HE WILL EAT 60 FRESH EGGS FOR BREAKFAST

NEW YORK, June 13.—Here's what William H. Reinke proposes to have every other morning for breakfast as long as the bank roll lasts and he has a good job: Fifteen scrambled eggs. Fifteen fried eggs. Fifteen soft boiled eggs. Seven coffee rings. Five cups of coffee. Reinke describes how he proposes to have his eggs cooked, and continues: "I will eat them all in less than 30 minutes. I can do it, too, because I have eaten 50 eggs three times already." The egg eater is a mechanic employed in a garage in West 57th st. where he works at night. He lives at No. 306 West 26th st. He is 20 years old, hard as nails, close to six feet in height and weighs 190 pounds. "Every other morning, beginning tomorrow morning, I'm going to consume five settin's of eggs," says he. "I'd do it every morning if the purse would stand the strain, but she won't right now. I must wait for a better job."
