Get-'Em-While-You-Wait Divorce Colony Now Seeing Its Last Days

RENO, Nev., July 15.—Reno, as a divorce center, has received a knockout punch.

The new divorce law, which goes into effect January 1, 1934, requires a year's residence before application for divorce can be made. Since June 20 it has been impossible to come within the six-months' provision of the law.

Many internationally known women have sought Reno for marital relief. Mrs. Margaret Emerson McKim, daughter of Isaac Emerson, the "Bromo Seltzer" King, was one of these. On the day of the Jeffries-Johnson fight she acted as copy-boy for a local newspaper.

After her divorce from Scott Hollis McKim, the New York Beau Brummel, she was married in London to Alfred Vanderbilt.

Edna Goodrich, the actress, got her divorce in Reno, and immediately married Nat Goodwin. Virginia Harned Sothorn also obtained her divorce here and immediately married again. Mrs. Florence Jenkins, considered the most beautiful woman in Baltimore, was divorced in Reno. Her marriage followed immediately.

Mrs. Henry Hutt, wife of the artist, was recently divorced in Reno. Hutt once said that his wife was more beautiful than the Venus de Milo.

Wm. Ellis Corey, the steel magnate, secured his decree in Reno, so that he might wed Mabel Gilman, the actress. Corey built here as a guarantee that he intended living permanently.

Phillip Dodge, president of the Mergenthaler Linotype Co., divorced his wife in Reno, and scores of others fully as prominent might be mentioned.

R. M. Biddington, known as the father of the divorce colony, although a millionaire, got a job selling tickets in a motion picture house, in order to testify that he really was in Reno in good faith and had regular employment.

These are only a few of the hundreds who have helped make the Nevada city a "get-'em-while-you-wait" divorce court.

HUMPHRIES FAVORS UNHITCHING MISFITS

Judge Humphries, who granted 70 divorces in the past two weeks, gave out the following interview:

"If persons who oppose divorce would hear the testimony in numbers of cases tried before me, where cruel treatment is proved, where desertion and failure to provide are proved, where abandonment is proved, they would change their minds and come to the conclusion that because a man or woman made a mistake in getting married, they should not be called upon to carry that mistake through the balance of their lives.

"Let the divorce be granted where the testimony is sufficient, and give the girl at least a chance to profit by her experience and do better."

"In fact, when I was practicing law I secured numbers of divorces—I have stated more than 100, and I might say that I would not be far off by making it 200—and in almost every case where there was a remarriage to a third person, the woman profited by the mistake and did better in the second marriage than she did in the first, and the same applied also to the men. The fact is, we must take humanity as we find it. It is a world of mistakes, a word of misfits, and what little time persons have to exist in this life, it is better to let them exist without the worry and care and fuss, and not be either married or single, and when they have been separated from one to fifteen years, the technical bonds should be severed."

RAILROAD STRIKE NEAR ON SOUTHERN PACIFIC

employees of the Trans-Bay electric lines of the Southern Pacific Company in Oakland, Berkeley and Alameda, a general strike of all conductors, brakemen and yardmen of the company is threatened. Unless the railroad officials allow employees of the suburban lines to work on the same basis as employees of the steam roads, more than 5,000 men probably will walk out, affecting the lines in the territory extending to El Paso on the south, Ogden on the east and Portland on the north. A strike vote of all trainmen on the system is now being taken, and is returnable not later than July 27. The strike vote was decided upon following negotiations with Vice President E. E. Calvin, extending over a period of two weeks.

TRIO HAD MESSAGE TO GO AND LOOT STORES

LOS ANGELES, July 15.—Three women are held by the police today, following their arrest in a department store on charges of shoplifting. The prisoners, who gave the names of Mrs. Ruth Joseph, Miss Cora Joseph and Miss Clara Joseph, declared they are missionaries of the "Church of the First Born," and that they had stolen upon Divine command.

"I received a vision in which I was commanded to go forth and gather the spoils," said Mrs. Joseph, who acted as spokesman. "Our acts were not criminal, for they were ordered by the Lord. Our footsteps were directed to the stores, and for two weeks we were made to go, and guided. This is the first time I had been ordered to go forth and take things from others."

Mrs. Joseph explained the fact that all the stolen articles were colored red, blue or gray, by declaring that each color is symbolical, the red signifying the purity of the blood, the gray typifying the "wool of the lamb," and the blue the purity of the soul.
