

BODY OF PARACHUTE JUMPER WHO FELL 500 FEET IN BAY STILL UNFOUND

MAKES WILL DAY BEFORE LAST FLIGHT

The body of Francis Thayer, the parachute jumper, who was drowned in Elliott bay Saturday afternoon, after an unsuccessful dive from Johnny Bryant's aeroplane, has not yet been recovered.

Bryant rose to an altitude of 1,000 feet, when Thayer made the jump. He fell 150 feet before the parachute opened.

The descent for about 300 feet seemed perfect, when suddenly Thayer's right hand broke loose from the rope, and as he attempted to regain his hold, his left hand slipped. Thayer fell about 600 feet striking the water on his side, and sinking as though weighted with lead.

Wife Sees Him Fall

Mrs. Thayer, Aviatrice Alys McKee, wife of Johnny Bryant, and Mrs. Fred Bennett, wife of Fred Bennett of the Bennett Aero Co., who managed the exhibition, witnessed the accident from a launch.

Thayer, the day before his flight with Bryant, which he had been planning for some time during his employment as a helper at the Harbor Island hangar, made a will and turned it over to his wife. It reads as follows:

To all concerned: This is to certify that the bearer is my dearly beloved wife, and that in case of serious injury or death, I desire her wishes to be carried out without question.

In case of death I desire that all money due me be paid to her and I hereby give to her all my worldly goods, including personal property and 160 acres of timberland situated in Idaho, the deed of which my mother has for safekeeping.

Birdie, in case of death, you will notify my mother, Mrs. Charles Thayer, Aberdeen, Wash., in care of Norton Coons. With love to all and malice toward none.

SEATTLE SOCIALISTS PUT RIOT TROUBLES UP TO PRES. WILSON

In a memorial to President Wilson, written by Bruce Rogers and approved by the state executive committee of the socialist party, at a meeting at 31st and Madison Sunday afternoon, blame for the riots in Seattle Friday night is put on the "ill advised speech of Secretary of the Navy Daniels, at the Rainier club, which is described as a parvenu organization, which hovered to the last about the unhappy fortunes of the notorious Federal Judge Hanford."

We further submit under this clause that severally and collectively we have held ourselves at all times ready, upon the slightest intimation, and without resistance, to answer to any court or other constituted authority, for our acts and utterances.

Second—That no one of us, or anyone in the name of the socialist party, has ever advocated, done, attempted, or even remotely dreamed of any desecration to the flag of the United States, or any emblem or insignia thereof.

Third—That for over a year next preceding this date a daily newspaper, to wit, the Seattle Times, has attempted in every way known to corrupt and depraved newspaper practices, and has bent its every energy in falsehood, misrepresentation and abuse, toward the creation and infatuation of a criminal, lawless and intemperate mob, to avenge itself upon us, to destroy our libraries, offices and book stores, and to threaten our very lives.

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Due to the fact that in the minds of the public, and in official and court records, the chief editor and principal owner of the publication was in the recent past associated with the most criminal, degenerate and depraved element of the community, one of the intimates of Charles W. Wappenstein, being now an inmate of the state penitentiary, and due to the fact that the publication is notoriously known to oppose every upright endeavor of the people, its vengeful and lawless program toward us was of no avail.

First—That no member of the socialist party, or anyone in the name of the socialist party, has either recently or remotely, or at any time, advocated violence or the destruction of property, or at any time whatsoever done or committed any act of violence or deed subversive of fundamental property rights, or done any act contrary to the laws or subversive in any way of the peace and dignity of the nation.

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OUR MORGUE DEPT

In a number of motor accidents since Saturday, women were the chief victims.

A head-on collision between two touring Washington automobiles, near 17th av. N. and Garfield st., Sunday afternoon may result seriously for Mrs. S. P. Shafer, 4071 Second av., an elderly woman, who drove one of the machines. The other machine was driven by Ralph Silgar, of Tacoma, who is held by the police. Mrs. Shafer says he was on the wrong side of the road.

In Silgar's car were two young women and a man named Andy Jose. One of the girls, Miss Helen Cuitce, was badly bruised. Silgar says Mrs. Shafer became so badly excited that she threw up her hands and let the machine get beyond control.

Mrs. A. Wright, 62, 1219 Dexter av., was badly hurt when she was knocked down by a motorcycle driven by Chester Miller, of Stanwood, Wash., at Eighth av. and Pike st. Her back was wrenched and a finger broken. She was taken to the City hospital, but felt well enough to go home late last night. Chester Miller was riding alongside Neils Miller, of Mt. Vernon, and the latter crowded off the former to the sidewalk. It is reported at headquarters. Both boys are charged with reckless driving.

While making a sharp turn into the Kent road early Sunday morning, the auto owned by E. Berreiter, mayor of Kent, went into a ditch, smashed the two front wheels and the wind shield, and seriously hurt some of the women in the party. Mrs. C. W. Gregory was so badly cut about the face that it required 15 stitches. Mrs. Nancy Stewart was hurled some 20 feet and also was badly hurt. The rest of the party, consisting of Mrs. Berreiter, C. W. Gregory and Mrs. Adam Jorgenson, escaped with slight injuries.

An automobile, driven by W. H. Connors, 2232 Sixth av., skidded off the road a few miles south of Georgetown Sunday morning, and
