ASK LIGHTER SCHOOLROOMS

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 1.—What is expected to prove the most far-reaching ruling ever held for the purpose of spreading the propaganda and teaching the science of school hygiene, came to a close Saturday afternoon, after sessions lasting since Monday. Many of the most important discussions scheduled for the Fourth International Congress on School Hygiene had been reserved for the final session. Sir James Kerr, of the London county council, England, was one of the notable speakers of the day. The titled Englishman denounced school systems which do not include the most up-to-date methods of illuminating school rooms. He declared that the fact that one-third of all public school children have defective vision is due almost solely to improper illumination of school rooms. Appeal was made to all women's organizations to join in the fight for advancement of school hygiene.

"SEPTEMBER MORN" COVERED

VENICE, Cal., Sept. 1.—"September Morn" has fallen under the ban of Chief of Police Lingo and has been relegated to obscurity. Not the original "September Morn," but a reproduction painted on pennants. About two weeks ago these pennants made their appearance on the beach stands, and the demand was great. Last week a comedy "September Morn" made its appearance on the pennant stands, showing a woman emerging from a wash tub. This was labeled "September Morn in Africa." Then Chief Lingo made the rounds and told the stand owners that they would have to take the objectionable pennants in, and if they insisted on selling them they would have to be sold without being displayed.

IS A PRETTY HEFTY BABY BOY

OKLAHOMA CITY, Ok., Sept. 1.—The birth of a 21-pound baby was reported to the state health department from Sulphur, Ok. The baby is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Chaffin and was born August 14. It weighed 21 pounds when born and is a perfect and healthy child in every respect. The mother is 33 years old and the father 44. Both the mother and baby are reported as getting along splendidly. The parents are both of normal size.

WOMEN UNFIT FOR JURY DUTY?

BOSTON, Sept. 1.—Three reasons why women are unfit for jury duty were advanced here today by Hugo Munsterberg, following a series of psychological experiments. "In the first place," he said, "women are not willing to listen to argument and won't change their opinions. Then, too, they are mentally stubborn."

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—Chicago a wicked city? Oh, mercy, no. Chicago, like the Bowery, Barbary Coast and Butte, Mont., is reforming. And in evidence that she is making the effort, Chicago would have you take a look at the voluminous reports and recommendations of her investigators, at her recently enacted ordinances, regulating art, questionable dances and clothes, and at her newly adopted policy of "pinching" half a hundred suspected "jackrollers" in the West Madison and Desplaines st. districts every day. It may be mentioned, with just a suggestion of a wink, that Chicago has no "red right" district, that disorderly houses have all been closed, and that the former habitues have vanished as if in thin air. Making Chicago good is a job that has building a new Rome backed into the bushes, according to the reformers, and it will take more than a day, they say. But the main thing is that Chicago is really trying to be good.
