**CLERK PULLS GUN ON WOMAN AND ESCORT; SHE IS WOUNDED**

Told to cease annoying the woman, H. E. Carpenter, 20, a clerk, fired four shots at S. G. Kelly, a yeoman from the cruiser St. Louis, and Mrs. B. Baker, waitress, of Tacoma, at 1 o'clock this morning, at Eighth av. and Madison st.

The woman was hit on the wrist. One bullet slightly grazed Kelly on the right side. The other two shots, fired from a 22-caliber revolver, went astray. Carpenter, who is said to have been infatuated with the woman, is held at the city jail on an open charge. Kelly and Mrs. Baker are held as witnesses.

Mrs. Baker came here to testify in a divorce case. Kelly had known her in Tacoma, when the St. Louis was stationed there. She told him Carpenter was annoying her, and they decided to hunt him up and tell him to quit. Carpenter got mad and drew his gun, they say. The girl's screams attracted Patrolman McGrath and Sergt. Putnam.

**GOVERNOR SULZER HOPEFUL**

ALBANY, Sept. 16.—Of his triumphant exoneration at his impeachment trial, scheduled to begin here Thursday, Gov. Sulzer today expressed the utmost confidence.

Sulzer's supporters insist the house managers of the impeachment case must stick to and prove their original charges, without dragging in new matter. The governor's opponents, on the other hand, declare they are entitled to bring in as many new accusations as they please.

**KILLS WIFE, THEN HIMSELF**

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16.—An inquest will be held today on the bodies of Mrs. John P. Hogan, killed by her husband yesterday, and of Hogan, who afterward killed himself.

The Hogans had been married two years, but separated several months ago. Furious at his wife's refusal to return to him, Hogan went to the house where she was staying, cut her throat with a table knife, and then, hurrying to a friend's house, told what he had done and cut his own throat with a razor.

Mrs. Hogan's father is Louis Olsen, a Stella, Wash., sea captain.

**POURING INTO CHATTANOOGA**

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Sept. 16.—Visitors for the Grand Army of the Republic encampment continue to pour into Chattanooga today by the thousand. The 17th regulars, from Fort McPherson, and the Third Tennessee Infantry gave an exhibition drill during the forenoon, and the afternoon will be occupied by committee meetings. The Sons of Veterans' convention opened today.

**LONG-LOST PEARLS FOUND**

LONDON, Sept. 16.—All but one of the 59 pearls composing the \$65,000 necklace, which disappeared early in July, while being transported from Paris to London, were found on a street in North London today. The jewels were wrapped in ordinary wrapping paper.

**AND SO THEY ALL VOTED "NO"**

Councilman Goddard said the commission form of government is dangerous. Councilman Peirce said he hadn't yet heard "the voice of the people demanding it."

Councilman Marble said he heard "no cry for it." And Councilman Bruskevich was against it on general principles. So, when the question of submitting to the people an election of 15 freeholders to prepare a new charter came up, Monday, there were four votes against the measure, and only three—Councilmen Griffiths, Ward, and Erickson—for it. Councilman Haas was absent and President Hesketh couldn't vote, as he is now acting mayor.

Seattle will not have commission government unless an initiative petition shall force an election.

**ANOTHER TRAIN IS TAKEN OFF**

The 6:50 interurban train did not arrive at Riverton this morning. No, Anastasia, there wasn't any wreck. The schedule was badly bumped; that's all. Trains got away so late that the 7:25 train overlapped the 6:50.

In other words, the company took off one more train from the usual service this morning.

The 7:25 pulled into Seattle with 123 passengers in the front car—and only 50 of them had seats.

This afternoon at 5 o'clock, the Duwamish valley citizens' committee, headed by D. A. Morrison, will meet the state public service commission at the Seward hotel, when they will present a petition for relief from the present inadequate service.

**MAY BE BODY OF MISSING MAN**

SANTA CRUZ, Sept. 16.—Gaston Ganahl is expected here tonight to see whether the corpse washed up yesterday on the Monterey bay beach is that of his brother Lucien, who threw himself or fell from the deck of the steamship Harvard, southbound from San Francisco, on the night of August 20.

The body was first seen Saturday, when it was clad in the fragments of a blue garment of such a color as the palmans Ganahl was wearing when he disappeared. Before it was brought ashore, however, it was carried out again by the tide, and when next washed ashore was nude. Though badly decomposed, it is believed the body can be identified by the teeth and various marks.
