WHERE'LL WE BUILD BRIDGE?

Sixth av. N. E. or Tenth av. N. E.? Where should the bridge over the canal at Latona be located? The council seems to be hopelessly divided. For three hours they debated it Saturday, but came to no decision. A motion, made by Councilman Erickson, who favors the Tenth av. location, to leave it to the people at the next election, was defeated by 4 to 2, Councilman Griffiths voting with him. Councilman Wardall, who previously voted for the Sixth av. site, said he was not sure which location would serve most people, and that the traffic from the country district would better be accommodated. Those favoring the Sixth av. location declare there are five schools in the Wallingford district, and that hundreds of homes have been built there, on the presumption that the bridge would be located at Sixth av., and it would be bad faith to change the location. Engineer Dimock, in his report, favors the Tenth av. location, because it will give satisfaction to a greater number of people. It will cost, he estimates, \$410,000, as compared to \$380,000 for the other location.

HOLDING NEGRO FOR MURDER

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 6.—Shuddering with fright, and apparently on the verge of a nervous breakdown, Burr Harris, a Los Angeles negro, who was arrested early Sunday on the suspicion of having murdered Mrs. Rebecca P. Gay, Christian Science practitioner, in Los Angeles, ten days ago, is held here today with Mrs. Cecilia Curry of Los Angeles, one of the five women who say they saw a negro prowling around the office building where Mrs. Gay was found brutally murdered. Detectives Hickok and Erven of the Los Angeles force, who arrived here last night, aided in conducting the severe examination, which was held behind closed doors. The strongest circumstantial evidence against Harris is said to be the fact that a piece of gaspipe used in the murder was found in the yard of his home. The theory of the Los Angeles police working here on the case is that the negro was hired to do the work by persons unknown. When arrested, Harris carried a revolver. He talked freely of the charge against him, and stated that he was confident of proving his innocence.

NOW WE'LL ALL BE GOLFERS

Work on the municipal golf links on Beacon hill, the only city-owned links on the Pacific coast, is going on rapidly enough to assure playing on the new course by next year. A force of men from the park department, aided by the stockade prisoners, are working on the course. The new links cover 101 acres, constituting a full-sized, 18-hole course, covering a distance of 6,000 yards. The tract is bounded by Spokane st., 24th av., Alaska st. and 16th av. S.

JUMPS TO DEATH FROM FERRY

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Ray Gillogley, son of a livery stable owner here, and his friend, Elmer Beck, were held at the city prison today, pending investigation of the suicide of Luce M. Gibson, 20, who yesterday leaped from a ferryboat bound from San Francisco to Oakland. It was said Gillogley and Miss Gibson were to have been married in December. The girl's father is George Gibson of Stockton. She had been staying with friends in Berkeley. Her cousin, Miss Ethel Vincent, told the police that she and Miss Gibson visited San Francisco Saturday night, met Gillogley, took an automobile ride with him, and were out so late that it was decided the girls had better go to a hotel. While she was arranging for a room, according to Miss Vincent's story, Gillogley and Miss Gibson disappeared. Beck was in Gillogley's company when the police called on him.

SEEK HINDU WOOER OF GIRL

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Efforts by the Contra Costa county authorities to unravel the mystery of Rosa Domingo's death centered today around the quest for the 18-year-old girl's wooer, the Sikh, Said All Khan, who worked alongside her in the Metropolitan Match Works at Stege. Physicians said that the girl was strangled before her body, weighted with railroad iron and chains, was sunk at the foot of the California Cap Works' wharf, at Stege, the bruises on her head and face probably having been made by striking against the piling of the wharf when the loosening of the chains allowed it to rise. The letter signed "M. Said All," asking the girl to join the Sikh, which the police found in the girl's room, and the fact that a man answering the Hindu's description called on her a week ago convince the authorities that said All knows something of her death.

TEAR AIGRETTES FROM HATS

PARIS, Oct. 6.—French milliners voiced their horror today at the news that American customs inspectors are enforcing the new tariff law's clause against the importation of aigrettes or other wild fowl plumage by tearing it from the hats so decorated worn by passengers arriving from Europe. They had understood that hats could not be shipped, but never imagined they could not be worn into the country. The situation, they said, will completely disorganize their trade with Americans.

TO HEAR STRAPHANGING CASE

OLYMPIA, Oct. 6.—When the supreme court convenes, October 14, to take up the calendar, one of the first cases will be the "straphanging" case from Seattle, which involves the validity of the ordinance regulating the number of passengers that may be carried on each street car. The case will be argued before the entire court. It was argued last May before one division of the court, but will now be re-argued before all nine judges.
