

PROFESSORS EAT RAW POTATOES WHEN VARSITY WINS SWINGING A TOWEL IN CHAMPION'S CORNER TO GET HIS STYLE

STUDENTS HAVE BIG TIME AFTER TEAM NOSES OUT OREGON

The treasury of the Associated Students of the University of Washington is rich by \$1,900 today, as a result of Saturday's big game at Portland between Washington and Oregon, and won by Washington, 10 to 7.

There is a strong probability that Washington will play two games on the magnificent Multnomah ground. Horner and Manager Scott of the M. A. C. have practically come to terms for a game between Washington and the Multnomah A. C. eleven for a 1914 date.

Although the most optimistic official connected with making the arrangements for the big special train and hotel accommodations in Portland did not expect more than 250 students to make the trip, close to 400 rabid Washingtonians parted with cold cash for tickets. The special that carried the Seattle boys to Portland consisted of a string of 11 cars. At Castle Rock a stop was made while the staves posed for the movies.

To those who saw Roscoe Fawcett's antics when Oregon crossed Washington's goal line in the second quarter, it is absurd to consider the Portland sport writer as a man who could show absolutely no partiality in a game between an Oregon and Washington team. For a time Oregon held out for Fawcett as referee for Saturday's game. There was not an Oregon supporter among the 6,000 persons present who cut loose with more vigor than Fawcett did when Parsons threw himself between the goal posts. Later Fawcett's countenance assumed an aspect as one who had at that moment become bereft of his little Charley Smith booting the ball from placement, putting Washington in the lead.

The one feature that made Coach Bezdok proud in spite of Oregon's defeat was that the old "Oregon spirit" was so clearly manifested. Every one realized that Oregon's best chance in five years to beat Dobbie had come. One of those to answer the call was "Chuck" Taylor, formerly of Oregon, and the only Northwest player to ever make the All-American Taylor performed in the capacity of yell leader, and was mighty effective in bringing forth every bit of power the Oregon lunks had to give.

One incident arose which was not to the credit of Washington, by some artificial, had strangely come into possession of a throne which had carried a young Oregon queen during the ceremonies between halves, and was preparing to ignite the same, when Taylor became aware of it. Calling his cohorts, he dashed over to the Washington section demanding battle. Yell leader Mathieu used his good judgment and surrendered the box to Oregon, preventing bloodshed.

Mathieu, on the train, chose the sacred and mystic order of the Great Potato as his headliner in the way of entertainment coming home. Informing the staves aboard that they had been elected life members, Mathieu called for a parade down the aisles in search of prospective members.

The victors finally selected were Varsity professors, with a couple of deans thrown in. A speech or song was first required of the involuntary candidate, and then Mathieu called for a viva voce vote by the aspirant. "Lou" "Navy" was always the order, after which Mathieu would declare the candidate unanimously elected.

The next procedure was to compel the candidate to take a large bite from a big raw potato, which was really in need of a bath.

Among the victims were Prof. O. P. Cockerill and Dean Austin. Cockerill, who is Mathieu's criminal law teacher, addressing the students, assured Mathieu he could be expected to flunk for his pants.

Owing to the few minutes' difference between the time of the arrival of the special and the time for the game, the Washington rooters were compelled to watch the proceedings from the far end of the field. They did not have time to cheer the section which had been reserved for them, and which they found occupied on arriving at the game.

Coach Bezdok, in statements given out after the game, declared that Oregon will get Washington next season.

They may, but the coach is going to have a mighty big task on his hands to fill the vacancies left by Parsons and Capt. Bradshaw at the close of the present season. It was this particular trio which gave Washington the most trouble.


EXPECT GOOD GAME NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Next Saturday's clash between Yale and Harvard promised today to be the best football game of the year.

As the Artist Saw Kilbane Carrying Out His Program—A Feint With the Left and a Right Cross to the Chin Spelled Dreamland for Mars

"Southpaw," of the Cincinnati Post staff, swung a towel in Champion Johnny Kilbane's corner in the first round, and it was not long before he was shouting to the crowd that he had a champion engineer's job to do.

Johnnie Kilbane, world's featherweight champion, sized up "Knockout" Mars in one round, but spent six more breaking through Mars' guard with a punch that carried a knockout.

Kilbane returned to his corner after the first round and said: "I've got him figured. I'll have to let him hit me to get an opening. If I make him lead, I can catch him coming to me. I'll have to stop him with my left because of the way he stands."

Has It All Figured Out The champion has it figured closely, for in the seventh he feinted Mars into leading, beat him to the punch and dropped him.

After each round Kilbane came to the corner, and in a few words to Manager Dunn, told how the bout

looked to him, and Dunn added a few words. As Johnnie started out for the second round, Dunn said: "Don't let him lead too much." At the start of the third round, advised Kilbane to stay close to Mars, and thereafter Kilbane got to close quarters whenever he could.

Johnnie Opens Up Between the fourth and fourth, Dunn asked Kilbane if he was working on Mars very much. "Not yet; I'll start this round," replied Kilbane. And the fourth was the hottest seen in a Cincinnati ring in a long time.

Before the seventh, Dunn cautioned the champion: "This is the coming season, Mars is Saturday longer, so you better get in close and knock him. Cross your right." And that's what Kilbane did. He crowded Mars, poked out his head in a tempting way.

Mars started his left for Kilbane and Johnnie made a slight motion with his left hand, which caused Mars to drop his head a bit. Dead to the World. Then Kilbane shot his right across in front of Mars' left. The blow didn't travel more than a foot, but Kilbane stepped in with the punch, putting all of his 122 pounds behind it, and Mars' seconds were five minutes bringing him back to Cincinnati.

When his senseless opponent had been carried to his corner, Dunn told the champion over to help care for him. Kilbane laid the little fellow's dazed head against the ropes, placed his hands at his side to relax, and advised his seconds what to do upon reaching the dressing room.
