


THE HIGH TRAIL

FIGHT FOR MRS. WAKEFIELD

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 10.—Horror at the case of Mrs. Hester Wakefield, under sentence to be hanged in March for her husband's murder, promised today to crystallize into a state-wide campaign for the abolition of capital punishment.

Petitions are pouring in, asking the woman's pardon, or, at least, commutation of her sentence. Meetings are being held nightly to demand favorable action by the pardon board. Dozens of clergymen throughout the state will preach, Sunday, not only against Mrs. Wakefield's execution, but against the infliction of the death penalty on any one.

In the face of so strong a public sentiment, it was the general belief that the pardon board would be unlikely to refuse mercy. Lieut. Gov. Blakeley today joined the movement in Mrs. Wakefield's behalf, contributing substantially to the fund raised for her children.

KEEP ABOVE POVERTY LINE

"The real great business man is the one who will lift his employes above the poverty line," declared Rev. Wood Stewart, rector of the Epiphany Episcopal church, in an address to the King County Progressive league Tuesday night. "Roosevelt rescued the ten commandments from the trampling feet of Big Business. The remedy for present-day evils is not by way of socialism except as a last resort, but we must remember that unless there is a fairer division of economic wealth, thousands of men are going to join the socialist ranks, and they will be men of the cloth among them." Justice Fred C. Brown told of the operation of the lazy husband act. Glenn S. Corkery presided.

OLD MELODIES ARE POPULAR

The old, old melodies found a warm response from the audience that heard the Schubert club concert Tuesday night. "Ye Banks and Braes," "Dixie," "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes," "Sally in Our Alley," and others, mellow and sweet, were sung by 60 women and girls who sing for the love of song. And their singing was highly appreciated.

The settings and costumes were unique. All nations were represented. Contributed numbers were a violin solo by Miss Jennie Middlevich, the talented young Seattle girl, and the reading of a one-act play, "Phips," by Prof. William Pierce Gorsuch.

TO REPORT ON CUSHMAN SITE

The possibilities of the Lake Cushman power site as a city acquisition for municipal electrical lighting and power source will be submitted to the city council in a report by City Engineer A. H. Dimock. According to a plan announced by Mr. Dimock last spring, the lake is capable of producing 89,000 kilowatts if the lake level is raised 150 feet by a dam. To accomplish this it would be necessary to condemn about 8,250 acres of land. The timber on this land is estimated at 15,000,000 feet, board measure.

GAS KILLS TWO YOUNG MEN

EVERETT, Dec. 10.—As the result of gas asphyxiation, Leo Bolger and John Ryan, each 19 years old, members of the Everett company of the Coast artillery reserve are dead today, their bodies having been found in the Armory here. The young men, who had been playing cards in an ante-room of the Armory, evidently decided to spend the night there, and were overcome while asleep by gas, which is believed to have escaped from a heater.

COULSON GUILTY OF MURDER

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10.—A. R. Coulson, accused of shooting and killing Wm. Acker and George Kovack and wounding his common-law wife, Katherine Gallagher, as the trio were lunching in a garage on the night of September 19, was found guilty of killing Kovack, and the penalty was fixed by the jury at life imprisonment.

WILL FIND OUT ABOUT THEM

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10.—United States District Attorney Albert Schoonover today outlined plans for an official investigation to determine the cause of the high price of eggs. Since the recent announcement of a nationwide federal probe, the price of fresh eggs has dropped from 75 to 50 cents a dozen, although produce men aver that the present supply is no greater than two weeks ago. Schoonover said that the Los Angeles investigation will be thorough, and that consumers will be given an opportunity to air their grievances. He admitted that the matter may be given to the consideration of a grand jury.

JURY MAKES HER BIG AWARD

Damages to the amount of \$9,250 were awarded Mrs. Ella Gulgon Tuesday, in her suit against J. Addison Campbell and Archie, his son, for injuries sustained when the Campbell auto ran her down. The accident occurred April 5, at 14th av. N. E. and E. 56th st. The auto was driven by Archie Campbell, and at a speed, witnesses said was 40 miles an hour.

MRS. PANKHURST STILL WEAK

PARIS, Dec. 10.—Mrs. Pankhurst was secluded today in her daughter Christabel's apartments here, very weak. Her friends said her last hunger strike, following her arrest on the steamship Majestic and imprisonment in Exeter jail, just missed killing her, and that she certainly could not survive another. Nevertheless, the tender declared she would return to London Monday, though it may result in her rearrest, to keep an engagement to speak at an equal rights meeting. Mrs. Pankhurst was uneasy at the news that her daughter Sylvia had fallen into the hands of the police, after addressing a London meeting last night. She was accompanied by her suffragette body guard as she left the hall, but the bluecoats made a sudden rush and caught her before her escort had time to resist.
