

ENGLAND WILL TRANSFER MINISTER!

LONDON, Jan. 7.—"There is official authority for the statement that Sir Lionel Carden is about to be removed from the British legation at Mexico City," announced the Exchange Telegraph company, a local news agency, today, "and that there is no immediate intention of transferring him to another post." A high foreign official told the United Press, however, that "the foreign office authorizes a denial of the reports that Sir Lionel had been removed from England's Mexico City ministry, or that he has resigned."

BOOST YOUR CITY! HERE'S GOOD HUNCH FOR SEATTLE



Toledo, O., is booming! And Toledo is telling the world all about it. Every one who goes through Toledo get an eyeful of her boosting. For the Ohio city is doing her boosting on the largest electric sign in the world. The first flash shows a railroad train with the engine and cars at a standstill. Then the drive wheels start, there is a puff, puff, puff, from the smokestack, all the wheels start slowly at first, then gaining speed. The smoke breaks over the top of the train and the rail runs backward rapidly. The next display is of a large lake freighter, with flags waving, water breaking over the front, churning at the rear and splashing in waves along the side of the boat. When this effect is shown for eight seconds, the city slogan, "You'll do better in Toledo," appears in 18-foot letters, encircled by a high-speed border of three rows of lamps in red and amber colors. A total of 7,390 Mazda sign lamps are used in the lighting.

PLANNING TO END KANGAROO COURT

The senior council of the university will hold a meeting in the men's building at 6 o'clock Thursday evening to discuss final action regarding the abolition of the kangaroo court, and the establishment of a monthly literary magazine by the student body. "Mike" Hardy has been working out a set of rules by which "he thinks the kangaroo court can be held without the conventional rough-housing, which is unsatisfactory in the eyes of the faculty."

CEFALO FACING MURDER CHARGE

Louis Cefalo, who confessed to stabbing his wife Tuesday, today faces a charge of murder in the first degree. The woman died shortly after 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Girolamo Vicario, who is believed to have caused the jealousy which led Cefalo to commit the crime, also died from the effects of a bullet wound in his lungs. The police are unable to tell who fired the fatal shot. Both Louis Cefalo and his brother, Rafealo, who is in a wounded condition himself at the city hospital, admit having fired at him.

CHORUS TO SING "THE HOLY CITY"

RUSH NEW FERRY

It is possible that the new Kirkland ferry will be ready for the coming summer. The county commissioners Tuesday afternoon awarded to the Seattle Construction & Dry Dock Co. the job of preparing plans and specifications for the vessel, which is to cost about \$100,000. PAGE VERIFIES NEWS; PLEASER CAPITAL FOLKS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—It was learned positively today, on unofficial authority, that Ambassador Page, in London, had sent word that the English government intends to transfer Sir Lionel Carden to another post. Sir Lionel arrived at his post just as President Wilson was making his initial efforts to force Huerta from the presidency, seized the occasion to present his credentials to the dictator, and by the conspicuous recognition which he thus accorded to him, did a great deal toward strengthening the Huerta regime. It was intimated at the time, both in this country and in England, that the British foreign office was acting in Mexico to aid private interests, and that Sir Lionel was chosen for the Mexico City legation because he was friendly to these interests. Premier Asquith of the English cabinet, noticing his foreign office's policy threatened friction between England and America, denied an intention of embarrassing the latter, and, by virtually repudiating Foreign Minister Sir Edward Grey's anti-American Mexican policy, forced Sir Edward to alter it.

Read Up On It "For one thing," says McNeil, "it has given us an interest in the place which it would be hard to fill. There's a lot to know about chickens. Evenings and Sundays my wife and I read all the articles on chickens we can find. I work in the brick yard, and my wife looks after the chickens most of the time. I help after work at the yard." On paper the profits in eggs as a side line for an amateur are not large. The McNells had to buy feed. During the year they sold 699 dozen. CAPTAIN TELLS STORY OF RESCUE

BOSTON, Jan. 7.—Declaring a Carnegie medal the due of every one of the sailors who helped to save himself and his men from the sinking tank steamship Oklahoma, Captain Alfred Gunter and seven seamen rescued with him arrived here today on the Hamburg-American liner Bavaria. Loud in his praise of the Bavaria's crew, Gunter was equally emphatic in his denunciation of those who manned the Spanish steamship Manuel Calvo, the first vessel to respond to the Oklahoma's wireless calls for help. "The Calvo sighted us early Sunday," said Gunter. "After it had fooled around for a time a boat was lowered. Then there was some more fooling around. Finally the boat was picked up. After that the ship steamed away. If it had not been for the bravery of the German sailors on the Bavaria I should not be here." Gunter could not account for the loss of the ship. All he knew was, he said, that there was a crash, and the vessel broke in two. He didn't think there was an explosion.

DEATH AT SEA

PORT TOWNSEND, Jan. 7.—The steamer Repeat, which arrived here yesterday, 36 days from Honolulu, reports the death of Second Mate F. W. King, who was swept overboard during a terrific gale on December 18. Capt. J. R. McKenzie of the Repeat says the storm entered on the trip were the worst he has experienced during his 23 years on the sea.

PRIMA DONNA IN SEATTLE TO SING THURSDAY NIGHT

Yvonne de Treville, the coloratura-soprano, who will sing at the Moore theatre Thursday evening, is now in town, and is a guest at the Washington hotel. At the Moore concert, Yvonne de Treville will give a costume recital in three parts. She will first appear in the costume of Mile de Maupin, Louis XIV's favorite, and will render songs of that period. Next she will appear in a Jenny Lind costume, and will sing her favorite numbers. Her third costume will be a modern one, and she will sing songs especially composed for her by modern musicians.

IS FOUND DEAD

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 7.—Capt. F. Gray of the British bark Inverurie, owned by Milne & Co., of Aberdeen, Scotland, was found dead in the cabin of his vessel at 10 o'clock yesterday morning by Dr. Jay Tuttle, marine physician, and Vice Consul E. M. Cherry of this port. The cause of the death is unknown. Those on board the vessel knew that the captain had been ailing for several days, but his illness was not considered serious.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 7.—John McCauley, the policeman who arrested Leon Czolgoz immediately after President McKinley's assassination, died yesterday.
