U. of W. Girl's Prison Play to Be Produced at Seattle Theatre

How criminals are made in our penal institutions of today is shown in a play now in course of preparation by Miss Rachael Marshall, the university of Washington graduate, who lives at the Buckingham apartments, Seattle.

This is Miss Marshall's second play. She has chosen for it the name "The Crime of the Law." It will be produced at the Seattle theatre by the Bailey & Mitchell players the week beginning January 26.

As described by Miss Marshall, her new play will be original in that there will be no waits between acts. While the scenes are shifted, a voice from the darkened stage—a voice supposedly in the future—will tell the story of what led up to the crime of the law, and of how, after years spent in prison, the old man who had been a criminal in his youth, was made a good citizen through proper methods in prison life.

Visits Many Prisons Material for "The Crime of the Law" was gathered by Miss Marshall in various state penitentiaries, especially that at Salem, Or. She was assisted in large measure by Gov. West, who has ideas of his own regarding prison reform.

"My new play will be a much better production than 'The Traffic,' which had its first production here last year," Miss Marshall says. "My new play has been written at great leisure, and I have had the benefit of experience in writing.

Assisted by Bailey "I have visited the prisons at Salem, Walla Walla and at McNellis Island, where I talked with many of the prisoners. I have endeavored to put into the new play pathos and humor and tense dramatic situations. In this work I have been greatly aided by Mr. Oliver D. Bailey. He is entitled to at least half the credit."

"The Traffic," Miss Marshall's first play, is achieving great success in Chicago. In addition to the Chicago company, "The Traffic" is being produced by a road company in the Central states. A second road company will soon be organized.

Under the new income tax law, all corporations, joint stock companies, insurance companies and individuals deriving their income from the United States are required to file their reports with the collector of internal revenue before March 1, under penalty of being assessed an additional tax. If one is single, his income is exempt from tax up to an extent of \$3,000; if married, \$4,000 is the limit.
