# J. Pierpont Morgan's Daughter Tells What She Thinks of Working Girls in Interview for Star

New York, Jan. 27, 1914.

Anne Morgan, daughter of America's greatest financier and one of the principal heirs to his great fortune, has just left New York for a tour of Western cities, to include Milwaukee, Chicago and St. Louis. Miss Morgan told me, before leaving, that she is going into the West "to learn from it."



I saw Miss Morgan in the offices of the new home of the New York vacation savings fund, a philanthropy established to promote the welfare of self-supporting women earning small salaries, of which she was one of the founders and which she hopes will ultimately assume a national scope.  
In this house, on 39th st., near Fifth av., the girls who are known as tax "payers" of the association, because they pay \$1 a year for the privilege of sharing in its amusements, hold weekly dancing classes, where they and their young men friends may tango, Boston and one-step to their hearts' content. Miss Morgan attends these dances herself.

"I believe in dancing," she said to me, "and I find this talk of the immorality of the tango very tiresome. Of course, it can be danced in a manner that is suggestive, but no girl is going to dance the wrong way, once you have shown her the right way. Once in a while a couple may show by their manner of dancing that they don't know the right sort of tango, but we have instructors to show them how, and the suggestiveness, which springs only from ignorance of the dance, disappears when they see how beautiful the tango is. The tango, like any other dance, may be beautiful or outrageous, according to the nature of the dancers."  
"I am going out with Miss Westmore," continued Miss Morgan, "to learn what is being done in the West for the girl who has to support herself on small wages and with the hope that there may be something in our idea of vacation savings which will appeal to other cities."  
"You and I know that the girl who makes \$5 and \$6 a week cannot possibly live on her own resources in New York and save any money. In fact, no girl can support herself here on less than \$8, but a great many young women do live on less money here, because they are partially supported by their families. THE EMPLOYERS WHO DO NOT PAY WOMEN A LIVING WAGE ARE PARTIALLY SUPPORTED BY THE FAMILIES OF THEIR EMPLOYEES!"  
"You said a little while ago that all women work," I remarked. "Don't you know that in our large cities there are numbers of wealthy women who are married, but have no children, who live in hotels and who have not even the care of a house to occupy them? How do they work?"  
Miss Morgan answered: "Such women may do nothing for a little while, but they get awfully tired of it and look around frantically for some real work to do."  
"Oh, then they take up sociology as a fad," I interrupted.  
"How do you know that, fad? Give them credit for more sincerity, more purpose," Miss Morgan answered. "Women of wealth constitute the only leisure class we have in America. But really all idea of classes in the United States is ridiculous. We are a democracy and should have NO classes!"

County Treasurer Hanna is preparing for the annual tax-paying rush at the court house. His office will Saturday mail 100,000 statements to taxpayers, notifying them that tax payments are due on Monday, February 2.  
For prompt payment of real property taxes before March 15 a rebate of 3 per cent is allowed.  
It is thought that many companies will take advantage of this reduction. One-half of the taxes may be paid by June 1 and the other half by December 1 if so desired, without a notice of delinquency.  
If no taxes are paid by June 1 they become delinquent, and certificates of delinquency bear 15 per cent interest. Property owners may redeem the certificates by paying taxes and interest to the county or any purchaser who may have taken them up.

## 'GAMBLERS' NABBED; A DOLLAR IN CROWD

"Caught Without the Goods" was the title of a farce-comedy playlet staged in the municipal vaudeville house yesterday afternoon, with Police Judge Gordon as chief censor.  
Officers Griffin, Crawford, Gorman and Morris are listed as the dramatic personae representing the fabled "gambler's den" of six boys in a house at Hanford st. and Rainier boulevard, on a charge of gambling.  
The boys were C. D. Merritt, Jack Hathaway, J. M. Stevens, Leslie Elliott, Ray Hughes and Russell De Lop.  
Officer Griffin testified he saw no money on the table where he believed stud poker was in progress, and said only one dollar was found in the crowd. The charge, on motion of Prosecutor Boswell, was reduced to disorderly conduct.  
"Not guilty," said the chorus at the rail.  
"I can explain this," said Merritt. "I own the house, and live alone there. I frequently invite these boys in to my place to play cards."  
The boys of the "gambling den" were released. No medals for bravery were voted to the officers.

**MEN JUST LIKE INSECTS, SAYS BOY MURDERER**  
NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Police today are investigating the story told yesterday in Judge Rosalsky's court by 23-year-old Alfred Lohman, who told of parts he played in two murders, a score of dynamites and the abduction of girls for white slavery.  
Operations of an alleged desperado Black Hand gang, which the police believe, deserted Lohman after he had thrown a bomb into the plant at Lyndhurst, N. J., of Klee & Co., were laid bare.  
Lohman appeared before Judge Rosalsky as the principal witness against Angelo Sylvestro, charged with planting a bomb in a Houston st. tenement house.  
The motive for one of the murders, he said, was robbery. In the other, he said, he and two associates, were paid \$2 each for killing a Chinese.  
Asked whether he ever regretted taking human life, Lohman replied, "Why, no. It is the same to me as killing insects."
