Replying to H. C. Pigot, who charged him with being dependent upon the Chamber of Commerce for his support, John C. Slater, at the North End Progressive club meeting last night, said it was not true. Victor Zednick and Rosemond Denmore, candidates for the council, also spoke.

A. A. Pillar, of the republican county central committee, addressed the women supporters of A. J. Goddard for mayor at his headquarters in the Railway Exchange building yesterday afternoon.

George W. Dilling, former mayor, has been asked by the Municipal league and the Rotary club to file for charter commissioner. C. J. Smith, U. S. Elkensberry, Josiah Collins and J. E. L. James, filed for commissioners yesterday. The filings close Saturday.

J. D. Trenholme, speaking at Junction hall, Ballard, last night, laid stress upon the necessity of strengthening the civil service system, and declared there should be a check on the number of city employes in all departments. Portland C. Hunt, candidate for the council, also spoke.

Ira D. Lundy and J. V. Holton outlined their councilmanic claims before the Progressive league last night.

In an address at the Green Lake library last night, George B. Worley declared that since last October the city engineer's department has been numerically reduced to the extent of 56 men. Worley claims that the publication of his graphic chart has been largely responsible. Worley speaks tonight in Otman's hall, 24th av. and Lane st.

SHE OFFERS INSANITY PLEA

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—With the jury completed, everything is ready for the opening statements at the trial here of Miss Leah Alexander, charged with J. D. Van Baalen's murder. Throughout the examination of candidates for jury duty it was evident that temporary insanity would be Miss Alexander's plea. The prosecutor will ask for the death penalty.

CALIFORNIA STORM LETS UP

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28.—Cloudless skies marked today the end of the five-day storm that swept Southern California. The government weather bureau predicted clear weather for at least a week. A high wind prevailed throughout the night, dropping to a 15-mile velocity at daybreak. Low temperatures were general, but frost was prevented by the winds.

SAMMY MAY SPANK SOME ONE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Administration officials were reticent today regarding reports that Japan's interference had complicated the situation in Mexico. President Wilson and Secretary Bryan insisted, however, that no crisis was imminent. Confidential reports received by President Wilson today showed that the rebels were in control of more than half of the republic.

SUPPLY SENTIMENT TO DADS

BREMERTON, Jan. 28.—In addition to its regular council, Bremerton is to have an advisory council of nine members, to be appointed at the next council meeting at the suggestion of Mayor D. L. Cady. The advisory council is to be known as the Welfare league, and is to be the medium of keeping the city officials informed of the public sentiment on the various propositions coming before them for decision.

TWO MORE AFTER HAMILTON

The North End Progressive club and the Fremont chapter of the Men's Brotherhood of the Asbury Methodist church are the latest organizations to endorse the recall movement against County Commissioner Hamilton.

According to Commissioner McKenzie, Hamilton had Assistant Charity Commissioner Hagerman act as a spy at the Monday night meeting of the recallers in the Labor temple. "In case Mr. Hamilton is in any doubt about it," said McKenzie, "I want to announce publicly that after three years of association with him, I heartily endorse the move to recall him, and I will do all I can to further his removal at the earliest possible moment."

H. C. Pigot, candidate for mayor, has also openly endorsed the recall movement, and promised active support of it. Another recall meeting will be held Wednesday night at the Labor temple.

COP AND THUG HURT IN DUEL

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—Shot in a pistol duel on Portland Heights, Special Officer T. J. Healy and a man giving his name as Louis Stros, one of a pair of alleged burglars, are in the hospital. Encountering the men in front of the home of John A. Keating, vice president of the Lumbermen's National bank, Healy challenged them and both opened fire. Healy replied in kind.

OLE TO MAKE LINCOLN SPEECH

Ole Hanson, progressive candidate for the United States senate, will be the chief speaker at the Lincoln day banquet given under the auspices of the King County Progressive league. This was the program determined upon by the popular vote of the league membership at a meeting held Tuesday night in Goods Eats cafeteria. The program committee is also arranging for the following speakers: Mrs. Wallace Williams, of North Yakima; Prof. Walter G. Beach, of the University of Washington; Robin Welts, of the university; Dr. Coe, national committeeman of Oregon, and Mrs. E. M. Rhodes. The meeting last night was addressed by James E. Bradford, corporation counsel, on the municipal street car situation, and Stuart A. Rice, on the minimum wage commission.

JAIL FOR PUG WHO SLUGS COP

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28.—Jimmy Clabby, claimant of middleweight pugilistic championship, is held in the city jail here today without bail as the result of a midnight encounter with Policeman C. E. Laurance, who is nursing a broken jaw in a hospital. According to other officers, Laurance interrupted a gang fight, in which Clabby and two friends were opposed to several taxicab drivers. The pugilist crashed a right swing to Laurance's jaw and the officer went down unconscious.
