### GODDARD'S REVIEW

The argument does not follow reason that general taxation would be reduced by commission government. It has not been, wherever tried—distorted figures to the contrary notwithstanding. Neither has it anywhere been shown that public money has been fairly distributed as when there was a proper check and accounting, and, besides, the levy would be general while the distribution could be very unfair; for instance, the city pays approximately 85% of the county road and bridge tax and the commissioners expend about 15% of it for the benefit of the city streets. They think they are justified in law for this, and I am not criticizing them, but it illustrates the point.

If there were equal competence and economy under our present plan and that of commission rule, it would require an equal number of men to handle the work. This being the undisputable fact, there can be no reason under the sun for uniting the levying and expending powers.

"Madge, I will not have you talk like this about my mother!" said Dick in anger.




