FARMINGTON, Ill., Feb. 2.—"Keep your \$1,000, Mr. Carnegie! I'll take no reward for doing only my DUTY!"

These ringing words are from plain Philip Gill—mine hero.

He is the first person to decline a hero-prize. Gill, a bluff, hearty Scotchman, 75 years old, and for nearly 50 years a mining superintendent, deliberately took his life in his hands and worried his way into the smoking depths of "No. 6 mine," near here. A terrific explosion had trapped two of his men in the deepest gallery. Gill started calmly down to rescue them or die with them in their prison!

I asked Gill today why he alone, among all the 800 who have received Carnegie hero-prizes, refused to accept.

"Do people ask," he smiled, "why a captain at sea stands by his ship? 'Tis just binding tradition that the master of a vessel MUST go down with it—unless he has seen the last of his crew in safety first. I MERELY DID MY DUTY!"

"I took Tom Mills, the mine boss, with me, and James Bennie came along unasked."

"Down 200 feet of spiral stairway we went, in the blackness, nearly smothered with after-damp; and then Bennie yells, 'The stairs are blown out!' 'Twas 30 feet more that we had to climb down, over those rickety timbers."

"I left Mills and Bennie to find one of the men, and I worked my way alone deep into the gallery."

The lamp on my cap was out, and I was nearly gone with choking. I can remember shaking my head and growling to myself in a kind of rage—like an animal!

"It seemed a lifetime I'd been down there—and it WAS over an hour."

CATCH DESERTER AFTER 3RD BREAK FOR HIS LIBERTY

BREMERTON, Feb. 2.—Extreme precautions are being taken by naval officials to guard W. O. Bowser, second-class foreman, recaptured last week in Sandpoint, Idaho, after a sensational career as a deserter.

He is now under heavy guard at the navy yard.
