**WHAT'S DOING IN POLITICS**

A number of conferences are on today, all with the view of getting some of the mayoralty candidates to withdraw. This is the last day when they may withdraw and keep their names off the ballots. With the draws after today may be made, but the names will remain on the ballots just the same. It is possible one or more candidates may drop out, but not probable.

Six mayoralty aspirants will speak at the Rainier Beach Improvement club meeting tonight at Lakeside hall. They are: Griffiths, Pigott, Worley, Judge Wood, Slater and Judge Winsor.

Austin E. Griffiths will also speak at the John Hay school tonight, and J. D. Trenholme will speak at Stevens school and at May's hall, in the University district.

E. M. Weisfield, socialist candidate for the two-year councilman term, has lived in Seattle for 22 years, attended the public school here, and is well known to the younger generation of the city.

Austin E. Griffiths has issued a public letter, asking all the other mayoralty candidates to join with him in making public campaign expenses one day prior to the primary, February 17.

Over 24,000 registered in the precincts Friday and Saturday, bringing the total to 56,614. The books will now remain at the Prefontaine building until February 10.

Candidates for the council will be quizzed by the Women's Good Government league, at the Y. M. C. A. auditorium at 8 o'clock tonight. The following will be grilled: P. S. Shaw, J. Edward Chandler, Julius F. Day, Charles D. Raymer, C. Allen Dale, A. E. Flagg, Ira D. Lundy, Mrs. Margaret C. Munns will preside, Miss Florentine Schage will ask the questions and Miss Mary G. O'Meara will referee.

At the Commercial Club Saturday, George B. Worley created a sensation when he stated that J. D. Trenholme and Hiram C. Gill were the only mayoralty candidates who do not use city light.

Austin E. Griffiths, J. D. Trenholme and Judge Richard S. Winsor will speak at the monthly meeting of the Methodist Brotherhood, Queen Anne Episcopal church, Tuesday evening, at 6:30.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 2.—After being locked up 72 hours, Louis Braun, one of the jurors trying Detective Chief Grigsby on larceny charges, said he was being treated like a criminal, and cut his throat, though not fatally.

**WOMEN WORRY WOODROW**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—President Wilson had his choice today between declaring out and out for woman suffrage, stating definitely that he would not announce his position, or refusing to see a suffragist delegation 400 strong, gathered in the capitol to question him.

He seemed worried. The women arrived on two special trains and gathered at suffragist headquarters, ready for the march, with a band leading them. They represented every profession, business and trade in which women are engaged. All were active workers.

**SHE CAN LIVE CHEAP AT \$22.51**

How cheap can a working girl live? The minimum wage commission inserted ads in various newspapers of the state, in behalf of a fictitious "Minnie Scott," asking for board and lodging. Numerous replies were received, and the average cost, it was discovered, would be \$22.51 per month. It was learned, however, that many of the rooms offered were unfit for human habitation.

**WON'T NEED EXTRA SESSION**

According to Gov. Lister and State Bank Examiner Hanson, there will be no need for a special session of the legislature to amend the laws so as to permit state banks to come under the national currency system. An effort will be made during the coming week to get the state banks to subscribe sufficient money to make, with the amounts to be deposited by the national banks, the required \$4,000,000 to entitle Seattle to the regional bank, if the regional bank committee should decide to locate one in this city.

WE WILL vote on commission government, perhaps, next June or July, no matter who is elected mayor. It will be up to the people by direct vote, and not to the mayor, to decide whether Seattle is to have commission government or not.

**ONLY THREE HIT THE BOTTLE**

One of the officers of the American Federation of Labor, in a letter to Charles S. MacFarland, general secretary of the federal council of the Church of Christ in America, declares he saw only three delegates to the labor convention in Seattle under the influence of liquor during the two weeks' session. The letter was sent to the Rev. Sydney Strong of the Queen Anne Congregational church, in connection with charges made against Samuel Gompers at the United Mine Workers' convention, in Indianapolis.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 2.—Lincoln Beachey, the aviator, had a miraculous escape from death here Saturday, when his engine exploded 1,000 feet in midair. He veighed more of the distance and he dropped 150 feet into a tree. The machine is a total wreck, but Beachey escaped unhurt.
