Few fans realize the tremendous strain resting on the fight referee. Standing within the ropes at the completion of a battle, they have an overwhelming sense of responsibility to the men whose money is at stake, as well as to the contestants whose fortunes are involved.

Just before reaching for the gloved hand of the victor—in that half-minute interval—the tense expectancy of thousands of men has always been upon me like a great flood, especially when the decision was close.

It is little short of terrible. That's one reason I never really "see" a fight, although I am watching it more closely than any ringsider. My impression of it is purely technical, and I miss that human element which makes the real battle for the fan, the thing that provides the thrills.

Often I have asked afterward whether or not it was a good fight. It's like a man learning to play the piano. He's so busy with the keys that he can't hear his own music.
