MME. PAQUIN SHOWS VERY LATEST IN GOWNS; EVENING COSTUMES HAVE NO BACKS

suits are very long in the back, falling in straight lines nearly to the knees, with pleats at the side to give fullness. In the front they are very short, of the kind we have always known as Eton jackets. Some of these Eton fronts are rounded like a bolero. Some are slashed upward, showing an undercoat of Roman silk.
All the hats worn by Madame Paquin's models were of two types. One was small with a narrow, straight brim and a high crown, with regular wreath-like trimming of silk dahlias circling the crown. The other was absolutely crownless, really just flat ovals of straw set on top of the head and poked over the face with the aid of velvet streamers. All hats, by the way, are worn on the side.
A novelty in evening coats was built exactly like a Mexican serape or blanket cape, one side folding about the wearer over the opposite shoulder.
Madame Paquin's evening gowns were entirely sleeveless, or else had long sleeves transparent to the elbow, and from there down made opaque by crystal or bead trimming. The long sleeves fitted well over the hands in points.
Nearly all the evening costumes were practically backless, the back consisting only of a narrow waist band of the material. Sometimes the expanse of flesh was veiled with tulle.

WASHINGTON IS SECOND RICHEST

In monetary value, the University of Washington has been listed fourth in comparison with all state universities, according to a recent report issued by the United States bureau of education, at Washington, D. C.
Wisconsin, with a valuation of \$1,865,361, is given first position; Minnesota, valued at \$1,849,001, is rated second; Ohio comes third, with a \$1,583,000 valuation, and Washington follows with an estate estimated to be worth \$1,053,000.
Cornell has the largest reserve fund, its endowment being \$9,523,465, according to the report, while Washington is second with \$5,000,000.

PROFESSORS FIND OLD CHESTNUT

The presence of the dreaded chestnut blight, which causes a loss of about \$500,000 yearly to some of the New England states, was recently discovered by Professor T. C. Frye and John W. Holton of the university botany department in a new shipment of seedlings from Japan. State District Horticultural Inspector F. M. Rhodes noticed that the shoots were covered with queer bumps and took samples to the professors for an examination, which resulted in finding the blight.
This is the first appearance of this disease on the Pacific coast. The entire shipment has been ordered destroyed.

THIS IS CADET DAY ON CAMPUS

The first Cadet day in the history of the institution was observed at the university today, and all afternoon classes were suspended that the students might attend and participate in the athletic program, which began at 1:15. Prizes were awarded for nine events, among which were wall scaling contests, centipede races, competitive drill for both non-commissioned officers and privates, rescue races and equipment races.
Besides the regimental parade and review, there were exhibitions of tent pitching by Company F, N. G. W., and of establishing field radio stations by the signal corps, N. G. W.
A ball will be held at the Armory tonight.

BASEBALL WAR NOW IN COURT

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., March 20.—Suit to restrain Catcher Killifer from playing baseball with the Philadelphia National league club was filed in the United States district court here today by the Chicago Federal league club. The suit marked the first court action directed against organized baseball by the outlaw organization. The court was requested by the Federals to subpoena Killifer, who lives in Grand Rapids. Killifer signed with the Federals and then jumped to the Nationals.

UNION IS SUED FOR \$4,000,000

DENVER, March 20.—Alleging conspiracy and intimidation, the Colorado Fuel and Iron Co. filed suit in the district court today for \$4,000,000 damages against national and state officers of the United Mine Workers of America. Three other suits, aggregating \$3,000,000, will be filed by the operators later.
They charge conspiracy to paralyze working conditions in the coal fields.

COUNTY MUST CARE FOR LEPER

The surgeon general of Washington, D. C., has refused to allow Dr. Eugene R. Kelley, state health commissioner, to remove Christ Katalisto, the Winlock leper, to the government quarantine station at Diamond Head, according to announcement today.
The man, who is the father of a family of ten, is at present in charge of Lewis county officials, near Centralia.

JUAREZ IS IN HOLIDAY CLOTHES

EL PASO, March 20.—Juarez was being decorated today in honor of Gen. Carranza's expected arrival Sunday. Triumphant arches were being erected, flags are displayed, and preparations are under way for an illumination. Carranza is expected to bring his cabinet with him and make the town his headquarters until Mexico City is taken.

FAMOUS MUSICIANS AT MOORE

Jean Gerardy, the greatest cello player in the world; Gabriel Yaaye, the Belgian violinist, and Carl Bruchhausen, German pianist, will make up a concert trio to be heard at the Moore theatre, tonight.
