### 4 AMBITIOUS YOUNG MEN GET SNAGGED

Law Puts Damper on Drivers Who Go Into Business for Themselves.

**RUN INTO INJUNCTION**  
Can't Solicit Business, Judge Says, in Territory of Former Employer.

Judge Everett Smith has permanently enjoined the Capital Dye Works from soliciting business from the customers of its older competitor, the City Dye Works Co.

The partners in the Capital Dye Works—A. C. Basel and three others—are young men, and were formerly employed by the City Dye Works as drivers. Recently they quit their jobs and started in business for themselves.

The City Dye Works Co. claims the "good will" of the customers of the City Dye Works is an asset—as it is—so, as drivers for that company, made it. I cannot see that our case is any different from that of the clerk in a store, for example, who has made friends and customers for his employer. Can he, then, be enjoined from going to work in another store, or from waiting upon, in that store, the people who bought of him in the store he quit?

Can he be enjoined from starting up in business for himself? Must he be always a clerk on a clerk's wage?

"That, it seems to me, is the position in which the injunction has left us. We must either work for the City Dye Works, or get into some other business that we know nothing about, or move to another city. We have no money to fight the case further."
