THE REFERENDUM

For Baby Vallie 38,365
For the state 190
BABY VALLIE'S MAJORITY 38,175



The wedding in the state penitentiary at Chester, Ill., when Cora Calvert and Charles Kimzey (Convict A915) were married by Prison Chaplain J. R. Duffy. Baby Vallie, whose picture is shown at the bottom, got a name and a father by the ceremony, and Kimzey, who had served three years of a 30-year sentence, for wronging the mother, was pardoned. The Star and newspapers in 70 other cities joined in a referendum vote on the question of whether the state or Baby Vallie was most entitled to Kimzey's services. The vast majority rolled up for Baby Vallie was responsible for Gov. Dunne's act in pardoning the man.

The national referendum in which this newspaper joined with a number of other newspapers to develop public opinion in the now famous case of Baby Vallie, was unique in two particulars:

It was unique because it was the first time newspapers representing every section of the nation associated themselves together to obtain by vote such an expression. It was unique because the election was so one-sided. Some of the newspapers which took part in the project sent the votes received by them direct to the Illinois board of pardons without counting. We are sorry for this because it does not permit us to give our readers the total vote cast on the proposition as to whether the services of Convict A915 rightfully belonged to the state or Baby Vallie. However, we give herewith a capitulation of the vote of the newspapers which made a count and reported the result to a central point:

2 REGIMENTS UNDER ARMS IN N.Y. STRIKE

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 24.—With two regiments of state militia assembled in armories here, ready for strike duty, comparative quiet reigned today at Lancaster, 15 miles east of here, following yesterday's riots, in which one man was killed and many injured in a clash between 2,000 strikers and guards on a train carrying strikebreakers to the Gould Colliery Co. Promiscuous shooting occurred throughout the night. Several men were wounded. At midnight the 74th regiment assembled in the armory here and a detachment was sent to guard the colliery plant. The 65th regiment later was called out and assembled in its armory. The crews of 12 street cars on the International railway were suspended because they refused to carry militiamen to the depots when the call for the National Guard was issued. Division superintendents and inspectors took out the cars. The militia is unpopular with the car men since the street railway strike here last year.

CRISIS PAST; THERE'LL BE NO IRISH WAR

LONDON, March 24.—The crisis in the home rule for Ireland fight was over today. The government and Ireland appeared victorious after a life and death battle between three parties—the king, the cabinet and the opposition. It was generally believed King George forced the cabinet to placate the militant army officers. Official statements today declared that all misunderstandings have been swept away. The home rule bill, it is said, will be put in force just as Premier Asquith and the cabinet intended. A MINISTERIAL CONFERENCE IN LONDON with government officials, Gen. Gough, Col. McEwan and Col. Parker returned to their regiments today with the assurance, it was generally understood, that they would not be compelled to fight against the Ulstermen. Many considered this a distinct surrender by the government, and Ulstermen were jubilant. To the outsider it appeared as if the future of the home rule bill was still wrapped in dark clouds.

FUGITIVE IS CAPTURED BY AEROPLANE

MIAMI, Fla., March 24.—Borrowing Harold McCormick's big hydroplane, detectives overhauled a steamer 21 miles at sea, and arrested John Gullford, a negro waiter at the Royal Palm hotel, charged with robbing a society woman of jewelry. After the steamer Miami had sailed for Nassau, it was recalled that Gullford, who had disappeared, had been spending a good deal of money. By wireless he was located on board the vessel. McCormick's giant hydroplane, with a capacity of six passengers, was in the harbor. Operated by Chas. C. Witmer, and the machine got under way, and overhauled the Miami within an hour. The sea was calm, and no difficulty was experienced in alighting alongside the Miami. The fugitive offered no resistance, and after transferring him to the air craft, the return flight was made in record time.

HEAVY SLAUGHTER IN MEXICO BATTLE

EL VERJEL, Durango, Mex., March 24.—Gen. Villa's rebels occupied Gomez Palacio today after one of the most stubborn battles of the present revolution. The bombardment from both sides was terrific. A number of warehouses and cotton presses were in flames this morning. The constitutionalists occupied Gomez Palacio at 9 p. m. yesterday. Three hundred federal prisoners were taken. Fall of Torreón Near. Gen. Velasco, federal commander, started to retreat, but returned to the defense when reinforcements arrived from Torreón. With Lerdo also in rebel hands, it was believed that the fall of Torreón is a matter of hours. At dawn today another effort was made to dislodge the rebels, and a terrific cannonade, directed by Villa in person, caused tremendous loss of life among the federals. Real Test to Come.

COWS INFECTED

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 24.—The report of Guy Overhulse, state veterinarian, shows that of 123 cattle belonging to Andrell brothers, whose shipment of milk to Everett has been forbidden, 102 are infected with tuberculosis and 12 are doubtful.

GIVEN 4 YEARS

WESTMINSTER, B. C., March 24.—Joe Angelo, union organizer, convicted of riot conspiracy in connection with the Nanaimo coal strike last summer, was sentenced to four years in prison. Nine others were sentenced to one year or less. Fifty-one others, though convicted, were released.

PASTOR BALKS

TACOMA, Wash., March 24.—Because the Ministerial Alliance insisted on a secret meeting, Rev. C. P. W. Stever, pastor of St. John's English Lutheran church, and candidate for mayor, declined to address the association.

ORGANIZE BANK

VALDEZ, Alaska, March 24.—The First Bank of Valdez has been incorporated here with capital stock of \$25,000. The incorporators are S. and M. Blum, and E. B. Wheat, who will take over S. Blum's present banking business.
