The committee approved the plan of giving grand opera in English and at prices within the reach of all lovers of music.

It is believed that the success of this venture will mean a long step toward making Seattle the musical center of the Northwest.

KING COUNTY MEDICS TO INVESTIGATE RICHARDSON

The King County Medical society appointed a committee of five prominent physicians last night to look into charges which have been made against Dr. Waldo Richardson, superintendent of the county hospital.

A report will be heard at the next meeting. Dr. Richardson is at present a member of the Medical society.

CHARGE HE EMBEZZLED \$70,000

SAN FRANCISCO, April 7.—Alfred Auzo, Pacific coast manager of the Turner Cotton Mills of New York, under arrest here on a charge of embezzling \$70,000 belonging to the New York firm, refused today to issue a statement.

He will be given a preliminary hearing today before Judge Deasy.

Auzo was arrested yesterday in Oakland by Detective Kalbach.

The accused man attempted suicide when he recognized the detective.

Auzo and his wife were well known in Berkeley church and social circles. He owned a beautiful home in the Claremont district.

SPANISH WAR HERO IS DEFEATED

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 7.—That Oscar W. Underwood, majority floor leader in the house of representatives, has defeated Congressman Richmond P. Hobson for the United States senatorship by 22,000 votes in Monday's democratic primaries throughout Alabama was indicated today by returns which cannot be completed before Wednesday.

The size of his majority was something of a surprise, as Hobson was expected to make a stronger showing by virtue of national prohibition advocacy, whose cause he preached throughout the campaign, while at the same time denouncing Underwood as a friend of the liquor interests.

GRIF WAS SURE SOME WONDER

Following the disappearance of Capt. J. H. Griffiths, under arrest on a charge of a \$3,000 shortage in army funds, he has been posted as a deserter, and the customary reward of \$50 is offered for his capture. If apprehended, he must face two courts-martial, with a penalty of dismissal for desertion and ten years for defaultation.

Investigation has disclosed that he had successfully financed a timber deal involving \$600,000. The final details were yet to be accomplished on the deal, which would have netted him an income of \$100 a day at 6 per cent interest.

WILL TRY IT OUT ON PORTLAND

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Reforms in postal service affecting the entire country are to be tried out in the Portland postoffice, Postmaster General Burleson having today selected that city to be the site of the first of a series of "model postoffices."

Portland was chosen because of the number of practical reforms in the handling of mails, money orders and postal savings business suggested by Postmaster Myers, and because of the intense interest he has taken in the matter.

The five independent divisions in the Portland postoffice will be cut to two, namely, a division of mails and a division of finance.

AN ENGINEER OR A CHAUFFEUR?

OREGON CITY, April 7.—Charging that C. H. Kenny, engineer in charge of the train, was "reckless and incompetent" and that he was compelled to wear glasses because of weakened eyesight, C. P. Hagen, father of Melvin Hagen, killed by a passenger train while crossing a trestle near here, today filed suit against the Southern Pacific railroad for \$7,500.

The complaint alleges that Kenny, "prior to January 7, 1914, had killed 21 persons, all known to the plaintiff."

TACOMA IS REAL EXCITED TODAY!

TACOMA, April 7.—Tacoma is choosing a mayor and two commissioners in today's primary election, and also deciding the question of creating a port district, the double-platoon system for firemen, and a few minor amendments to the city charter. The registration is 26,205.

The majority nominations seem to be between A. V. Fawcett, Rev. F. W. Stoeber and Homer T. Bone, the latter a socialist. Two are nominated, unless one receives a majority of all the votes cast, in which case he is declared elected. There are nine candidates.

TEN GOVERNORS WILL CONFER

DENVER, April 7.—The annual conference of Western governors opened here today at 10:30 o'clock. Ten governors accepted the invitations to attend the meeting. There was no set program for today's session.

Gov. Odell of Nevada was the first to arrive, and Govs. West of Oregon, Lister of Washington, Haines of Idaho, Stewart of Montana and Spry of Utah reached here in the course of the day.

WE WILL JUBILATE \$200 WORTH

Seattle will spend a little money to celebrate when the first section of the municipal street car line is opened, at the end of the month. The council appropriated \$200 yesterday to pay the expenses of a suitable jubilee when the first clang of the gong is heard on the new line.

PROHIBS GAIN HOLD IN MICHIGAN

LANSING, Mich., April 7.—Prohibitionists were jubilant today over yesterday's election in 12 counties, in which seven voted dry. The most notable victory was that in Ingham county, which contains Lansing, the capital of the state. The "wets" won three counties now dry—Clare, Oscoda and Wexford.

FOLSOM, Cal., April 7.—Recognizing a newspaper picture of Percy Barnes, wounded in Saturday's Folsom penitentiary outbreak, as that of a son he had never seen nor heard from in two years, H. S. Barnes, a Sacramento county rancher, hurried to the prison to see him.

NOW WE MUST HAVE SOME HAM

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 7.—The Empress of Russia brought here a consignment of 1,000 tons of Chinese eggs, containing 6,792,360 eggs. Most of the shipment will come to Seattle for distribution in Eastern markets.

WILL FOLLOW UNCLE SAMUEL

LONDON, April 7.—Labor members of parliament said today that as soon as the Irish home rule bill is disposed of, they intend to begin pushing for the creation of a cabinet labor portfolio. The department will be similar to the American labor department.


