GLOWING TRIBUTE IS PAID TO PIONEER LEADER OF BAND, "DAD" WAGNER

Seattle paid tribute to "Dad" Wagner and his band in celebration of the 25th anniversary of the organization last night, at the Moore theatre. Prof. Edmund S. Meany of the University of Washington gave a brief introductory address in honor of "Dad" and the 10 men who have been with him since the time he first started his "brass band" in Seattle. The men on the honor roll with Wagner were: A. C. Anderson, O. M. Snyder, George F. Carter, Sol Asher, Harry West, Samuel Price, Conrad Bisher, D. C. Conn, J. J. Cross and H. A. Eckstrand. They blushed as the large audience cheered.

After that a curtain went up, revealing the 100 members of Wagner's Silver Jubilee band. The crowd "went wild" as "Dad" signaled the musicians with his baton, and the band started off with the "Washington Post," a march familiar 25 years ago.

At a Georgia Camp Meeting was played for an encore, and then a score of more of the old-time favorites were played with wonderful effect on the delighted listeners. Some classical music and some hymns were thrown in for good measure, just to show that Wagner's band can play anything, from highbrow to the raggiest of good old tunes.

It was a grand celebration. If any of the famous leaders of the world have ever gotten by with a more enthusiastic reception than "Dad" Wagner received last night, they had to go some, that's all.

"OPEN FORUM" LODGES PROTEST

The Open Forum adopted a firm and emphatic petition to the president and congress, condemning the "horrible doings of the thugs in the state uniform of Colorado" in which men, women and children are shot and burned to death at the instigation and instruction of mine owners and operators, and asking the president "to send the military to protect the lives and property of our citizens and those of the sojourners in our land," and that the thugs who have disgraced the uniform of the state of Colorado and improperly used the ensign of the United States as a cloak to their nefarious and cowardly acts be duly punished, and that the persons "higher up" be included in the punishment. That congress investigate the aforesaid and take into consideration other like conditions which have occurred in other states, and devise preventive measures.

ENEMIES UNITE AGAINST THE U. S.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 27.—That Mexican federal and rebel forces in the section here are uniting against Americans is asserted here today by C. A. Robson, of the Coahuila company of Palau. Robson, an American, cited as an instance of this the case of Gen. Juarida, a federal commander, and Gen. Monguia, rebel, who met at Baratarian, Coahuila last Wednesday, and were on the verge of fighting, when Juarida received dispatches containing the latest news concerning the American-Mexican crisis. Immediately, said Robson, the federal leader notified the rebel chieftain of the situation, whereupon the two forces united and declared they would fight side by side against intervention.

"DIVINE RIGHT" BAER IS DEAD

PHILADELPHIA, April 27.—George F. Baer, president of the Philadelphia & Reading railroad, died at his home last night, aged 72. Baer started life as a printer's devil, became a lawyer and was local adviser for P. Moran. From counsel for the Philadelphia & Reading he was made president, where he gained the title of "Divine Right" Baer by announcing, during the great coal strike, that "the right of owning, protecting and increasing one's property is of divine origin."

INFANT CLASS READY TO FIGHT

SAN DIEGO, April 27.—Boys of 12 years and less are being equipped with rifles at Ensenada, capital of the Northern district of Lower California, to fight with full-grown Mexican men against the "gringo." This is the message brought by Consul Claude E. Guyant, who has been ordered out of Ensenada by Secretary Bryan, reaching San Diego on the U. S. monitor Cheyenne. "It is the intention to abandon Ensenada and to march north to the border to join in the defense of Tijuana and Tecate," said Guyant.

S., Saturday, in company with Mrs. Chapman, his nurse. The parents were told the boy and the nurse were going to visit at the home of Mrs. A. Knipe, 6206 Woodlawn av. Late at night they became worried and learned that the two had not been at the Knipe home. The police were notified.

SECRET INDICTMENTS ARE ISSUED

PORTLAND, April 27.—Following the arrest in Seattle of D. E. Houston and Harry J. Harper, Saturday night, charged with fraudulently locating purchasers on tracts in Oregon & California land grants in Southern Oregon, it was learned today that secret indictments on the same charge were returned by the federal grand jury here, which adjourned two months ago. Houston and Harper were brought to Portland and are being held in the county jail.

SEATTLE LIVERYMAN IS KILLED

J. R. Canney, proprietor of a Seattle livery stable, was instantly killed near Auburn last night, when the automobile in which he was riding with his family skidded from the road and turned a complete somersault, burying Canney under the wreckage. The automobile was proceeding along the Pacific highway at a fair rate of speed when a woman stepped from the side of the road into the path of the car. When the driver attempted to turn out, the car skidded and turned turtle. Other occupants were only slightly injured.

SEQUIM TO CELEBRATE MAY 1

SEQUIM, April 27.—Mayor Gill of Sequim will be the principal speaker here at the May day celebration, when this community will celebrate the 15th anniversary of the date when the waters of the Dungeness river were turned on the lands through canals. The district has 40,000 acres, which may be brought under irrigation, with canals reaching but a small area as yet. Where water is on the land, it has been demonstrated that moisture means millions. A program of races, dances, athletics and sports has been arranged.

WILL VOTE ON CAR FRANCHISES

An alternative proposition in connection with street car line franchises will be put before the people in a special election by the charter commission. The clause makes it optional with the city council, in passing on a franchise, to keep or strike out the common-user clause and the reservation that the franchise be subject to repeal or amendment by council or the people.

GILL WILL CUT CITY EXPENSES

A campaign to reduce city expenses will be started by Mayor Gill this week. He intends to call a meeting of the municipal advisory board to discuss expense reduction and the refinancing of some of the outstanding indebtedness of the city. A general crusade for economy is the determination of the new administration.

ORDERS PROBE OF RAILROADS

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Investigation of the financial affairs of the Pere Marquette and Rock Island railroads was ordered today by the interstate commerce commission. The house commerce committee recommends that the probe start at once.
