Special Privilege Urges Real War in Mexico

WILSON MUST FIGHT AGAINST BIG INTERESTS

Star's Washington Correspondent Explains Why They Want Intervention.

WILSON PEEVES 'EM

They Disapprove of His Singling Out Huerta as an Opponent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—This war on Huerta is not the war for which the jingoes in and out of congress have been clamoring.

A tremendous struggle is on now to push the administration into a general war on THIS SITUATION SHOULD BE CLEARLY UNDERSTOOD.

The desire for a general war is inspired by the vast interests in the northern part of Mexico which have suffered from the revolutionary disturbance and which wish American intervention accompanied by the protection of property and the continuance of peaceful exploitation.

This is the explanation of the delay in congress—this is the explanation for all the talk by men like Fall of New Mexico, Root, Lodge and the other reactionaries, who as usual are PLAYING THE GAME OF SPECIAL INTERESTS AND BIG BUSINESS.

IT IS A BITTER DISAPPOINTMENT TO THESE INTERESTS THAT HOSTILITIES, NOW THAT THEY HAVE COME, ARE DIRECTED AGAINST HUERTA AND THE SECTION OF MEXICO WHICH HE CONTROLS, WITH-OUT INCLUDING THE CONSTITUTIONAL REVOLUTIONISTS.

It is most bitter to them that the president says distinctly that he has no quarrel with Villa and the revolutionists. They are rendered almost desperate by the administration's obstinate and repeated reiteration that the United States is not engaged in a general war on the Mexican people, will not be forced into a general war, and has no intention of invading or taking any action which looks to the acquisition of property or the assertion of sovereignty over Mexican territory.

Claim for Intervention
The spokesmen of the special interests already clamoring that the stars and stripes having been raised over Mexican soil must never be pulled down.

DISTINCTLY LET IT BE UNDERSTOOD THAT EXPRESSIONS OF THIS CHARACTER DO NOT REFLECT THE INTENTION OF PRESIDENT WILSON'S ADMINISTRATION.

On the very best and highest authority I state that the president still hopes that the present situation may work out only in a proper reparation forced from Huerta for his refusal to salute the flag and for the repeated insults and annoyances for which he has been held responsible.

The United States, when satisfied that its honor has been vindicated, can call its men back to its ships and depart from Mexico.

FINDS BOY AFTER LONG SEARCH; HE TURNS HER DOWN

A story of mother love was revealed when Mrs. McHugh Telfer met her 16-year-old son in superior court yesterday after a search of seven years, which took her to England, Canada and various parts of the United States.

She wept when the boy told her he had no desire to live with her and refused to leave Seattle and his high school work to go back to Chicago with her.

The woman said she had worked in a Chicago factory for \$30 a month, saving every penny for the trip she made. She told the court her husband, Alexander Telfer, left Chicago with the boy when he was 9 years old. Later, she says the husband obtained a divorce and married again.

She asks annulment of her husband's divorce and custody of the boy.

MEDIATORS IN MEXICO FUSS ARE HOPEFUL

Huerta Formally Agrees to Submit Trouble With U. S. to Arbitration.

TO LET 'EM OFF EASY

President Wilson Is Not Inclined to Drive a Hard Bargain.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Official notification that Gen. Huerta had agreed to accept the good offices of Argentina, Brazil and Chile to arbitrate the differences between the U. S. and Mexico was handed to Secretary of State Bryan today by Spanish ambassador here.

"The sky seems to be clearing," said Secretary Bryan, "and in the meantime we are getting our people to safety."

Mediation has been accepted by Washington and Mexico City, and the mediators are waiting proposals. Expect Difficult Task
When the proposals have been submitted there will begin the work of reconciling them.

It is admitted that this probably will be a more than difficult undertaking. If Mexico can develop a strong man, however, it will be the general opinion that something can be accomplished.

It is agreed on all hands that neither Huerta, Carranza nor Villa will do, since it will be impossible for all factions of Mexicans to agree on any one of them.

Huerta Must Withdraw
The mediators, therefore, are looking over the lesser factional chieftains, hoping to find one likely to answer their purposes.

It is learned on high government authority that the government has no disposition to drive a hard bargain, but it is said Wilson will insist on two things—Huerta's elimination and guarantee of the re-establishment of constitutional government.

MRS. ORNES DIES

MOUNT VERNON, April 28.—Mrs. Fred Ornes, wife of the editor of the Mount Vernon Argus, died at her home here last night of appendicitis. She was 29 years old, the daughter of J. H. Hannay, banker.

ROADS COSTLY

OLYMPIA, April 28.—Upon the completion of highway work for which bids are now being advertised, the state will have spent \$2,122,000 on road work since March 8, 1911, 296 miles of macadam surfaced road, and 126 miles of gravel surfaced road having been built. Two hundred and seven miles are under course of construction.

Nearly 4,000 will participate, including a 75-piece orchestra from the high schools and a crowd of boys and girls from the eighth grade, who will give the folk games of all nations in costume.

To make the celebration a real kid affair, and to keep down expenses so as to permit of low prices of admission, Ben F. Johnson, Miss Lucy Cole and others in charge of the arrangements have eliminated the high-salaried artists featured at festivals in former years.

Except for Miss Elizabeth Jaques and John Lince, two local singers, and a professional orchestra to accompany the high school chorus, there will be no "hired talent."

The entire instrumental part of the entertainment will be furnished by the high school orchestra, and the following soloists from the high schools: Pearl Dempsey and Jennie Middlewich, violinists; Fred Smelser, flutist, and Harold Gesler, trombonist.

Big Choruses to Sing
Three big choruses, each numbering 1,200 voices, will be heard. Friday night the high school chorus will sing under the direction of David F. Davies. Miss Lucy Cole will direct the chorus from the fifth and eighth grades at the other two performances, the latter singing Saturday night.

Twenty-five and 20 cents admission will be charged at the two evening performances and 10 and 15 cents at the matinee arranged for children.
