

Cynthia Grey's LETTERS

So many letters in behalf of our domestic animals have reached my desk that I print the following, with the hope and belief that people who read will help where they can—even the least of one of these.—Cynthia Grey.

A DOG'S PRAYER

We are the little brother, Homeless in cold and heat; Four-footed little beggars, Roaming the city street; Snatching a bone from the gutter, Creeping through alleys drear; Stoned and sworn at and beaten, Our hearts consumed with fear. Is your heart too hard to listen To a starving puppy's cries? Or too gay for the patient pleading In a dog's beseeching eyes? Behold us, your little brother, Starving, beaten, oppressed; Stretch out a hand to help us, That we may have food and rest.

Dear Miss Grey: Allow me to make an appeal to your readers in behalf of our dumb brothers—the dogs and cats that we often see on the streets in half-starved condition.

Now, in the advent of spring and summer, many people will be moving out to the green fields of the country, where refreshing breezes blow, and, unbelievable as it may seem, many of these people will leave their dog or cat home to suffer, and eventually to starve.

Dear people, if you should see one of these distressed animals at the house next door to you, and the folks have moved away, or should find one strayed away, anxiously looking at the passerby, or aimlessly wandering along, have pity on it and report it to the Humane society—if you do not want to take it home and feed it yourself. Do not try to still your conscience by thinking that "some one else will do it."

Also let me say to those who are interested in humane work that the Humane society of this city is in need of more members—it needs more money to carry on the work of mercy.

All kind persons who have \$2 to spare, for yearly membership would join the Humane society and give a little of their time to alleviate the suffering of the helpless, they could not find a better way to spend that money. Q.—Can you kindly advise me of anything that will remove liver blotches and freckles? I am almost ashamed to go out in company, on account of the liver blotches.

A.—Try washing the face at night with water in which a small amount of salts has been dissolved. If the skin become dry, massage with a pure face cream.

Q.—I've read your letters for a number of years, and now come to you with my troubles. I have been living with a man for three years, and he has treated me badly. He has beaten me and has never given me a penny for myself, and he drinks very hard and comes home and abuses me, and I have been a true woman to him. I am not married and want some advice. I want to know if I am not his common-law wife, now after three years? He has quit work and says he is going to leave me destitute. He has taken all the money. Can't I have him punished under the white slave law? I am 21 years of age.

A.—If you were under age when he induced you to enter such relationship, see the juvenile judge. The common-law marriage is not recognized in this state. If you are able to work, why didn't you? It is far better than to stay with a wife-beater. You must learn to be true to yourself, and you cannot do that in the life you are living.

Q.—Can you tell me anything about mating parrots? I will appreciate information.

A.—I cannot. If you will inquire at the public library, you can get the information, or write to or inquire at a bird store.

Q.—A friend of mine has been arguing with me that young people (not related) who are separated should let three weeks elapse before answering friendly letters. I say they should be answered as early as possible. Now, who is right?

A.—Correspondence usually regulates itself. Business letters should be answered promptly. As in all other affairs, good judgment should dictate how early a letter should be answered, but one side of the correspondence should not do all the prompt answering, nor does a prolific, toad-pole interchange of letters amount to much. A great deal of valuable time is spent in useless letter writing.

Q.—Will you please tell me how to blacken a straw hat? It is my last summer's hat and is very much faded where it was not covered. Please answer soon.

A.—Liquid shoe polish or black ink is very good to tone up the faded spots on a black straw hat, but it must be applied sparingly.

Q.—Will you please advise, through your column, something that will remove floor wax spots from wall paper, or any other greasy spot? Will appreciate your kindness.

A.—Benzol-magnesia is an excellent medium for the removal of grease spots from paper. Colored magnesia is mixed with sufficient pure benzol until a mass is obtained that is, after some time, friable. A little of this substance is carefully rubbed with the finger on the greasy spot, and the small crumbs of magnesia shaken off. Fresh spots usually disappear at once, older ones after a short time, especially if the benzol-magnesia is applied three or four times and then

NEW MISSION THEATRE TO OPEN ITS DOORS TOMORROW

The opening of the new Mission theatre Wednesday night will mark but another expression of faith on the part of business men the world over as to the permanency of the motion picture business, which has made such rapid strides the past ten years.

The Mission represents an investment of over \$85,000. Twenty thousand dollars of this represents the cost of a pipe organ.

Nothing that would add to the equipment of a modern photoplay house has been omitted in the construction of the Mission. It is absolutely fireproof.

The interior decoration follows out the Mission style of Southern California with scenes of old missions and palms painted on the walls and in the lobby.

The lighting will be through latticed grill work on the sides and red and green leaded glass on the ceiling.

The exterior lighting will be from 500 electric light bulbs over the dome, on the sides, and around the windows.

According to F. J. McCurdy, manager of the Mission, first run pictures will be shown and the policy of the house will be not to show any pictures at any time that might offend. Universal service will be used. Change days will be Sunday and Wednesday.
