RICHARDSON CRITICISED BY MEDICAL INVESTIGATORS

"In conclusion we wish to express our profound regret that a public institution provocative of so much good should be so dominated by politics as to mitigate against its greatest usefulness." Thus concludes the report of the committee of doctors appointed by the King County Medical association to investigate the county hospital and Supt. Richardson, following formal complaint by inmates to the county commissioners.

Ask More Leniency Although the visit of the physicians at the county institution was simply advertised, and the hospital corps was prepared to make the best showing possible, the committee found it necessary in its report to ask "a little more leniency and sympathy by employees to trivial infractions of the rules by inmates."

This sympathy toward inmates was expressed by the committee in spite of the statement that the only evidence of brutal treatment under the management of Dr. Waldo Richardson was the charge made by "a Mr. Thorpe, an inmate of the Alms house, who claimed he had been roughly handled by two orderlies and deprived of the use of some of his personal belongings."

Inmates' Work Not Arduous As to the charge that Supt. Richardson has compelled inmates of the hospital to perform work before they had fully recovered from their illness, the committee says: "The large majority of inmates agreed that the work they were asked to perform was not arduous."

A general complaint among the inmates, as discovered by the physicians, is that "there is not sufficient variety of food from day to day."

As a result of the investigation, the physicians recommend the consolidation of the county and city hospitals, declaring it would amount to a "colossal saving."
