RESISTS ARREST; RUNS AMUCK

RAINIER, Or., May 8.—As the result of a street fight caused by the refusal of W. C. Lee to submit to arrest on a charge of operating a saloon without a license, O. Danigan and Sam Laverre are suffering today from serious revolver wounds. City Marshal Nels Carlson encountered Lee and took him into custody. A struggle followed, during which Carlson's revolver fell to the sidewalk. Danigan, a friend of Lee, placed his foot on the gun and refused to remove it, whereupon Carlson butted him in the stomach. The revolver was discharged, the bullet passing through Danigan's body and wounding Laverre, a bystander.

HOLDS FORT AGAINST MEXICANS

WASHINGTON, May 8.—When the history of the Mexican crisis comes to be written, Louis D'Antin will figure among its heroes. Secretary Bryan said today. D'Antin was left in charge of the United States embassy in Mexico City on Charge d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy's departure, and according to the stories told by American fugitives from there, had defended it and the archives it contained against the mobs which had made repeated attempts to burn it. That his life had been in danger Bryan conceded, but he was still holding the fort against all enemies.

THINKS HE KILLED BY MISTAKE

DENVER, May 8.—J. C. Bulger, soldier of fortune, who shot L. F. Nicodemus Wednesday, following a quarrel the former had with Hugh Clark in a hotel lobby, faces a murder charge today. Nicodemus died last night, and the district attorney is preparing the information on which Bulger will be turned over to the sheriff to be tried for his life. The police were convinced the prisoner, muddled by drink, killed Nicodemus by mistake for Clark.

PHYSICIANS RACE WITH DEATH

RENO, May 8.—A special train, chartered by George Wingfield, millionaire mining man, carrying Dr. E. C. Fleichman and Dr. Francis B. Wakefield, arrived here from San Francisco at 8:15 a. m. today. The physicians were rushed in an automobile to the Wingfield home, where Mrs. Wingfield is reported in a serious condition, following the birth, Sunday night, of a son.

PRISON OFFICIALS TO TESTIFY

NEW YORK, May 8.—It was announced today that Warden Clancy and Chaplain Cashion of Sing Sing prison, who heard "Dago Frank" Croflic's confession shortly before his execution for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, were to testify at the trial of Police Lt. Chas. Becker, accused of having murdered Herman Rosenthal.

ALBANIA GOING AFTER REBELS

DURAZZO, Albania, May 8.—King William, Albania's new ruler, was making preparations today for a campaign on a large scale, for so poor a country, against the rebels in the southern part of his dominions. The rebellion is spreading rapidly, and William and his advisers were said to agree that it must be crushed.

WILSON'S POLICIES ON THE PAN

LOS ANGELES, May 8.—Denunciation of the Wilson administration, for its canal tolls attitude, tariff legislation and Mexican policy, and of progressives, state and national, are the features of a declaration of principles that is the outstanding result of a conference of republicans of Southern California. The meeting refused to endorse any candidate for governor.

ANGELS VOTING ON BOND ISSUE

LOS ANGELES, May 8.—Los Angeles is voting today on a proposed bond issue of \$6,500,000 for municipal plants for generating and distributing electricity for light, heat and power. The election follows the most heated bond campaign in the history of the city. Proponents of the issue accuse corporation interests of working toward its defeat. Both sides claim victory. Registration was 144,000.

PROTEST AGAINST STOP RULE

Protesting against the recent rule established by the traction company, allowing stops only at every second block on the Phinney av. line, 60 residents of the Phinney district organized the Woodland People's Rights club last night. A committee will be appointed to take the matter up with the city utilities department.
