### O'SHAUGHNESSY WILL REPORT TO WILSON TODAY

WASHINGTON, May 8.—President's Secretary Tumulty held a conference today with President Wilson and then gave out the following:

"Reports that an attack is imminent on the American forces at Vera Cruz, or that a serious crisis has arisen there, are without foundation. There is no intention of sending additional forces to Vera Cruz." Nelson O'Shaughnessy was scheduled for a talk with President Wilson today.

O'Shaughnessy was known to hold the opinion that President Huerta would never voluntarily retire from his position.

The army general staff is considering the Vera Cruz situation with some uneasiness.

The Mexican troops in the city's vicinity are said to number 20,000, excellently armed.

The suggestion that another brigade be sent to strengthen Gen. Funston's force was rejected as likely to embarrass mediation.

### CAPTURE YACHT?

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—Relatives of Arthur Payne, son of a wealthy family, have appealed to Secretary Bryan, saying they have an unconfirmed report that Payne's yacht the Iola, in which he was cruising off the west coast of Mexico, has been captured by Mexicans.

Payne sailed from here March 28 with six friends and a moving picture outfit.

### FIRST IN YEARS

PORTLAND, May 8.—The gas schooner Dekoras arrived here yesterday with 9,000 pounds of halibut. She is the first deep sea fishing boat to enter this port within 20 years. She sold her cargo in an hour.

### BUYS BEER BEFORE HIS TOWN GOES DRY

KEWANEE, Ill., May 8.—Before Kewanee's 18 saloons were closed last night for the first time in 35 years, in compliance with the recent dry majority, one resident purchased for private use 60 dozen bottles of beer, which he figures will carry him almost two years. He consumes one bottle each day.

### SHOOTS CONDUCTOR WHO MAKES EYES

CHICAGO, May 8.—William Willis, conductor on an Illinois Central railroad train, was shot by a woman who gave the name of Mrs. Nellie Hargis, Champaign, Ill., a passenger on the train. Mrs. Hargis was taken to the station, where she accused the conductor of flirting.

### OWN KNIFE KILLS

ELLENSBURG, May 8.—J. P. Leclair, a Wilson Creek rancher, is dead today as a result of accidentally falling on his open jack-knife while making some repairs about his home yesterday. The blade entered a lung.

The attorney general's office is investigating the case as well as Burns detectives.

### RECALL FILED

CENTRALIA, May 8.—Petitions seeking the recall of Mayor H. W. Thompson, clergyman, and City Commissioners William Keir and Victor Jackson, were offered for filing to the city clerk yesterday. As they were not accompanied by the required affidavit, they were refused. The officials are charged with accepting money from disorderly women, permitting houses of ill-repute to operate in the city limits, and other breaches of the law.

### OPPOSES PLAN

Gen. H. M. Chittenden of the port commission opposes the plan for the commission to absorb the Renton Waterway project, petitioned for by Duwamish district residents. He declares the indebtedness of the port is too near the constitutional limitation to carry out the proposed absorption.

### BANK CASE ENDS

FAIRBANKS, May 8.—Trial of the case of F. G. Noyes, receiver of the Washington-Alaska bank, against the former directors of the institution was completed here yesterday. Judge Fuller will hand down his decision Saturday. The case involves \$600,000.

### HELP, HELP! SAVE OYSTER, CRY OF MISTER DARWIN

Save the oyster. Unless the courts give a broader interpretation of the laws the bivalves of the reserves are open to the ravages of dishonest men, according to State Fish and Game Commissioner Darwin.

He mentioned a recent case in Mason county in which a man accused of stealing oysters from state beds was dismissed because it was decided a technical error had been committed in that the information did not state the number of the reserve.

### UPHOLDS CITY

OLYMPIA, May 8.—No decision of the lower court was affirmed by the supreme court yesterday in the case of the Tacoma Railway & Power Co. against the city of Tacoma. The court holds the city has the right to take over the poles and equipment of the company furnishing light and power to Northern Pacific depot and shops, because the company ignored notices canceling its special permit.
