

TWO GOSPEL PILGRIMS WALK AND PREACH FROM PACIFIC CLEAR ACROSS CONTINENT

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 15.—Walk: to carry the message, not to those who have heard it and scorned it, not to those who are comfortably housed and clothed alone, but to those who need the gospel because they have nothing—not even faith to keep their courage true," said Dr. Smith.

These two new types of evangelists carry with them a glad, care-free atmosphere, and the fact that they ask nothing—not even so much as a cup of water—makes a strong appeal in this day of commercialism. They take what is given them, and aside from their bare necessities, return the gifts to the missions which they visit.

Trust Self to God "We ask for nothing, because we need nothing," continued Dr. Smith. "Human beings are always willing to trust their souls to the God who loves them, but never their bodies. Despite the promises of God to care for his creatures, they spend their days in useless worrying and care concerning their physical needs.

"Two years ago I was a doctor by profession, a drunkard by practice, and now, by the grace of God, I am a missionary. Our creed is the universal creed—the belief of all denominations that believe in the truth of Christianity." Sleep Out Under Stars Dr. Smith told of some nights spent under the stars and others in the bunk houses of cowmen along the road.

"Twenty men along the way," he said, "have asked for prayers and have passed to think of God." Along the old Santa Fe trail, where in the old days pioneers in covered wagons dotted the landscape, and where the Indians in war paint terrified the settlers of the new land, these two strange bearers of the old, old message will follow and pause in many strange quarters to tell their story.

COUNTERFEITING PLANT IS SEIZED BY U. S. AUTHORITIES

With the seizure here yesterday of a counterfeiting plant valued at several thousand dollars there is a mystery that has baffled the police of Washington and British Columbia, U. S. secret service men, and even stirred the Canadian authorities at Ottawa. The seizure was made by J. F. Stratter, government operative, who has been working on the case several months, but gained his first clue from a business card found in a pocket of Frank C. Bright, alias Frank Berger, wounded by a policeman here on April 30, while attempting to evade arrest for trying to pass a \$5 counterfeit Dominion of Canada bill. The card led Stratter to Stephen Groll's tailor shop, 315 Vesley way, where he broke open a trunk belonging to Bright and found a receipt for goods stored in a room on Railroad ave. The clue led to the discovery and seizure of the counterfeiting plant. Stratter estimates it is worth from \$2,000 to \$3,000, and that the gang has passed counterfeit money amounting to \$10,000 during the 10 months they have been operating. Stratter thinks there are five men in the gang and that they are all foreigners. Bright denies any connection with the gang, and says he knew nothing of the plant, despite the fact that seven \$5 Dominion of Canada bills were found on him. Counterfeit bills have been passed in Puget sound and British Columbia cities since last November, and even a Seattle bank accepted three \$20 bills.
