BRYAN GIVES WARNING ON SEAMEN BILL

Measure Providing for Safety at Sea Being Throttled in Committee, He Says.

TREATY A PRETEXT

Delay Action Pending Senate Consideration of Big Business Frameup.

 WASHINGTON, May 22.—A startling accusation was made on the floor of the house when Representative J. W. Bryan of Washington, speaking of the seamen's bill, now in the house committee on merchant marine, said:

"As one on the inside, as a member of this committee, who knows what is going on, I warn the friends of the bill, the friends of the seamen of this country; I warn the friends of labor, the friends of legislation for safety at sea, and all those who are interested in this bill; I warn them all, as one who knows how certain the bill is being pocketed, how slowly it is being considered, that if public sentiment does not make itself felt and force action by that committee, no timely or adequate action will be taken and the democratic party will again be convicted of violating its platform."

The pretext employed for defeating the seamen's bill is consideration of the London treaty for safety at sea.

The treaty is being considered by the senate committee on foreign affairs, and those who are understandingly trying to defeat the seamen's bill are pretending that the ratification of this international agreement would do away with the necessity for passing the seamen's bill.

The London conference for safety at sea was dominated entirely by the shipping interests. Its recommendations are reactionary.

There is just as much need for the seamen's bill today as there was the night the Titanic was wrecked. The seamen's bill attempts two things—first, to insure safety at sea; second, to abolish involuntary servitude among American seamen.
