The company claims he stole it. Tiberg was tried on a charge of theft and freed.

BISHOP SCADDING PASSES

PORTLAND, May 27.—Right Rev. Charles Scadding, Episcopal bishop of the diocese of Oregon, died at his residence here early today of pleural pneumonia. Funeral services will be held from the cathedral Sunday afternoon.

Bishop Scadding was born in Toronto, Ont., Nov. 25, 1861. He is survived by a widow.
