BATH, Me., May 28.—Aviator Glenn Curtiss today successfully flew the late Prof. Langley's flying machine, which, though it has long been recognized as built on theoretically correct principles, was regarded until today as a practical failure.

Langley, father of heavier-than-air machine experimenting, was never able to make his invention do more than glide earthward from elevated places. He finally died, largely of disappointment at his work's fruitlessness.
