STORES FIND A WAY TO EVADE MINIMUM WAGE

OLYMPIA, June 8.—According to a ruling by the attorney general, the \$10 minimum wage for girls employed in mercantile establishments, applies only for six working days a week and eight hours a day. Merchants may pay a smaller wage by cutting down the number of days or hours, according to the opinion given to Labor Commissioner Olson.

A number of stores will probably take advantage of the ruling to lay off some of the girls during the light hours of the day.

Q.—Will you kindly answer the following in reference to the game of pinocle or, if you cannot answer, kindly call on your many readers?

A.—I am sending you a recipe for the removal of marks from furniture caused by water stains and the like. A few drops of the spirits of camphor, on a soft cloth, applied to the stained parts, will immediately remove all marks without injuring the polish. I have found this a simple as well as successful remedy.

Will you please tell me, through your column in The Star, how to remove ink stains from white cotton goods? Thanking you in advance, I. A. B.

A.—Your remedy is more easily applied than the one I gave, and will be appreciated by the readers. My recipe is authentic, but if this is just as good, it will be found more simple.

A solution made from a teaspoon of oxalic acid crystals, dissolved in a cup of lukewarm water, will remove ink from white material. Rinse well several times, and be careful of cuts, as oxalic acid is considered poisonous.

PORT GETS DOCK

The county commissioners turned over the control of the King county wharf at Bellevue, Meydenbauer bay, to the port commission today. The commission operates a ferry to the Bellevue dock, and will exercise jurisdiction over the landing, following the agreement with the county.

Juror Charles H. Grout will be excused until tomorrow morning. Any man who has a wedding in his home is entitled to be there at the happy occasion," announced Judge Frater this morning.

Grout, who lives at 202 13th av. N., explained that his son's wedding comes off tonight.

PAN ANTI-TRUST LAW

The Employers' association of Washington has issued a statement denouncing the Clayton anti-trust law, which specifically exempts labor unions from its operation. The law is described as "class legislation, un-American and deserving condemnation."

HE'S SENTENCED

Victor Hammer, formerly a cook in the Savoy hotel, pleaded guilty today to second-degree assault in connection with the shooting of Mrs. Esther Tengren last March. He was sentenced to from five to ten years in the Monroe reformatory.

Jim Pasares admitted to Judge Gordon this morning that he entered the wardrobe of Anna Mandan and cut her clothes to shreds, but he said it was because relatives of hers owed him money.
