ROYALTY TO KOWTOW TO OUR GEORGE

King and Queen Going to Convention Over Which Cotterill Will Preside
WILL LEAVE JULY 10
Says His Friends Will Look After Campaign During His Absence

Confidently predicting both his nomination and his election, George F. Cotterill, democratic candidate for United States senate, plans a whirlwind campaign in the last three weeks preceding the primary. Cotterill will leave the state July 10, after filing his candidacy at Olympia, and will not return until August 16 or thereabouts.

"But that will give me plenty of time to finish up the campaign and land me the nomination," Cotterill says.

Cotterill to Preside
The former mayor will preside over the big international temperance conference at Christiana this year, which will be attended by the king and queen of Norway and other members of the royalty and distinguished officials of European countries.

Expects Friends to Help
As head of the templars in America, Cotterill will act as chairman of the congress, owing to the absence from the meeting of the president, who is unable to leave on account of duties in the Swedish senate.

Cotterill declares his campaign for the senate will be cared for by friends during his absence. His recent tour in the state convinces him he will easily be nominated.

There it is, little book! Dick never said a word to me about how I looked, and I don't think it ever entered his mind that any other man would do so.


Husband, dear, there is always another man who will do so.


