

HE HAS AN OPPONENT

Howard Waterman, Lawyer, Says Councilmen Will Regard Office as Honor.

"That any city should return to the old ward system is disgraceful and demoralizing," said T. H. Bolton, president of the Central Labor council, who spoke against the Hinky Dink charter at the Men's Brotherhood of the Madison St. M. E. church Monday night.

Howard Waterman, attorney, defended the charter.

Bolton ridiculed the claim that the new charter will make for greater efficiency in the business methods of the city.

Directors at \$5 a Week
"Can you picture the Seattle Electric Co. employing a board of directors to serve at \$5 a week?" he asked.

The salary proposed for councilmen, while the city manager, whom the council is to appoint, will get \$12,000 a year.

"I am not opposed to a large council," said Bolton, "if the whole city can vote on all the candidates who will be spending the city's money. Under the proposed charter, the voters have a chance to vote for only one of the 20 councilmen."

Council Controls Manager
Bolton also pointed out that by leaving the appointment of the city manager to the council, it is the latter, and not the people, who will control the city manager.

Waterman's defense of the ward system of councilmanic selection is summed up in the following words:

"The men who seek office must consider it an honor to serve without pay. If they do not regard the office as an honor, then I concede the system is likely to be a failure."

Audience is Inquisitive
Waterman argued that with smaller districts, the people can make better selections; that there will be plenty of able men to run for the office, and that it is not stepping backward to adopt the ward system.

Waterman was asked a number of questions by the audience as to whether the mayor would be a mere ornament at a salary of \$5,000, and why the council should have the appointing power of the corporation counsel, the city treasurer and other officials, as well as the city manager.
