A.—The Mason-Dixon line was commonly known before the civil war as dividing the slave-holding from the non-slave-holding states. The line was surveyed by two English engineers, Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon, between 1764 and 1765, for the purpose of settling the disputed boundaries between Maryland and Delaware on the one side, and Pennsylvania and Delaware on the other. It was so named after the surveyors. The line was again surveyed between 1801 and 1803, under the direction of a joint commission representing Pennsylvania and Maryland.
