

WANT ADS DECOY INNOCENT GIRLS TO THEIR DOOM

Lena Makela came to Seattle looking for a place to work. She had read a number of attractive ads in the "female help wanted" column of the newspapers.

Lena, you must remember as you read her story, is only one of hundreds who answer the call of the big city yearly. She is one of the few who hear about, for she refused to weakly submit to conditions as she found them. She chose another way out—POISON.

Lena is dead now. Her body is in the morgue and no one claims it.

No Decent Work

She answered one of the ads calling for girls to work in hotels. She did not accept the offer. She indignantly rebuked the "manager." She did not find what she had expected—honest work.

"What do you think you're coming to town for, any way?" demanded the man. "Starve, if you want to, I should worry."

Other places wanting girls proved just as disappointing.

Lena's funds ran low. She simply had to get a job. She paid \$3 to an employment agency grafter, but she got no job. The employment agent laughed when she demanded her money back or a full filament of the contract.

looking for work, saw her and asked her the cause of her trouble.

"I can't find decent work," sobbed the girl. Then she told the experiences with the "want ad" men as related above.

Last Sunday, in her room at 517 28th av. N., Lena took poison tablets. She died in the city hospital a few hours later.

Mrs. Allison read of the case and identified the body as that of the girl she talked with on the street.

True Story

"I know from experience that the girl told a true story," said Mrs. Allison. "A great many of the 'want ads' are nothing more than deceptions. A woman is in danger if she answers them. With another woman I answered an ad calling for a housekeeper in a hotel. We were insulted and left. It is true in many other places about the city.

"It's a disgrace to send a sane girl to an asylum but it's a greater disgrace for a rich city like Seattle to permit a girl to suicide because she can't find work. I really believe a girl is better off in an asylum than outside alone and without work.

"IF GIRLS WOULD THINK TWICE BEFORE RUSHING TO THE CITY FOR WORK THERE WOULD BE LESS TRAGEDY AND SORROW."

SUPREME COURT HECKLES LUNDIN

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 1.—A decidedly hostile attitude was manifested by the supreme court against the Hamilton recall, and it is probable that a ruling will be announced granting an injunction to prevent the recall election being held until the recallers file with the county auditor the names of all those who spent any time whatever—little or much—in the preparation and circulation of the petition. Attorney Al Lundin, appearing for the recallers, was practically heckled by the supreme court judges when he attempted to argue that there were hundreds of people who helped out whose names and the amount of time spent could not reasonably be known.

After argument of counsel, the case was assigned to one of the judges to write an opinion. What the ruling is has not been announced.

STOP OIL SHIPMENTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The Standard Oil Co. has stopped all oil shipments to Europe, such commodities being considered contraband of war.

WHEAT PIT NORMAL

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—A comparatively normal condition prevailed in the Chicago wheat pit today. No further furrows were expected. December wheat was up 1 1/2, but September was down 1/2 cents.

FORD WILL CUT PRICE OF CARS

Henry Ford, millionaire automobile manufacturer, who started the \$10,000,000 profit-sharing plan for his employees, has sprung a new one. As a result of the new proposition, owners of Ford cars stand to receive a share of about \$36,000,000.

Manager R. P. Rice, of the local Ford works, announced today that a reduction of \$60 a car on the price of Fords is now effective as one phase of the plan. If the production of the plant reaches the 300,000 mark by the end of the season, owners of Ford cars will be refunded from \$40 to \$60 each.

UP TO BRITAIN

LONDON, Aug. 1.—The French ambassador here this afternoon gave the following statement to the United Press:

"Everything depends on England. If she will inform Germany that her navy is prepared to strike, there will be no war. Otherwise the situation is hopeless."

Advices from Paris declared the German ambassador there would abandon his post tonight.

ALL OF EUROPE FACES FAMINE

LONDON, Aug. 1.—All Europe faces a famine today. The prices of foodstuffs are soaring. The supply in England, it is said, will hardly last a month, and prices trebled in Holland, Sweden and Norway, unaffected by the war, also face food famines.

What They Ask Cynthia Grey

Q.—Am a wretched, broken hearted girl. Have been married three years, but have been separated from my husband one year. Still I love him with all my heart. While traveling in the East I met a young man, became infatuated with him, and he haunted me until I left my husband and went to him. Now I see it was only a childish fancy. This young man would lay down his life for me, but I cannot be true to him, for my husband is before me always and I want to go back to him. I receive letters from him saying he still loves me, and that he wants me to come back. But I am afraid to go, for the young man here says he will kill himself if I leave him. A.—My dear Barbara, what your really need is a guardian. If your husband is willing to play that role for the sake of social decency, by all means go back and do your best to make yourself worthy of such a love as his. You will not find a man like him every day in the week. Don't stop to worry about the young man you are now with. He will be much more easily reconciled to your desertion than you will be to believe. He was principled to wile you away from your husband, and he will receive his just reward. You were weak to submit to his snare and I trust you have suffered sufficiently to be more sensible in the future.

DIFFERENCE IN MOUTHS

There are many mouths that require special features in Artificial Dentures. The patient may have a very fine upper mouth, caused by sloughing pyorrhea, abscesses of the alveolar ridge being thin and light, and the lower mouth may be a wall of the alveolar ridge are so completely lost by resorption that almost a flat surface remains. In such a case a very strong, light plate and set of teeth must be had or extra heavy lower plate is necessary for the natural involuntary muscular movement to aid in holding the lower denture in position while mastication is being accomplished.

TAKING SCIENTIFIC IMPRESSIONS.

Many dentists do not care to be bothered and labored with making plates, because, firstly, it is hard labor, and secondly, they do so very little of it. They do not wish to know and appreciate the skill required to make a real good set of artificial teeth.

Taking an impression is the all-important thing. It makes no difference how costly a pretty a set of teeth are, they are worthless unless they fit the mouth. If they do not fit perfectly, even then all excess resistance must be avoided and relieved of the muscles. In relieving resistance the suction must not be destroyed and the natural suction properly equalized and distributed or every fit contact will jar the plate loose.

The fit is not all, either, as the denture must restore the facial contour and natural expression, remove all wrinkles and lines.

The teeth must not be too white and unnatural. They must be set too long, yet long enough and of a color to look natural. These are a few of the many things that make a successful plate making, yet many dentists contend that all plates should be made of one price. This is a knowledge that they think all mouths are alike and that teeth should be made alike. They simply fail to comprehend the selection of material and the fitting of the plates down.

Q.—Who are the Orangemen? Are the Ulsterites Orangemen? Why do they celebrate July 12? What do their colors (orange and blue) stand for? Is it a military order? QUESTION BOX.

A.—The Orangemen are members of the Orange society, an association of Irish Protestants, originating in Ulster. The Ulsterites are residents of the county of Ulster, but, though the Orangemen are most numerous in Ulster, the terms are not synonymous. They celebrate July 12 because on that day the battle of Aughrim was fought and William III. defeated the forces of James II.

Their insignia and color seem to be represented in the orange-colored lily, which they wear each July 12. I can find no note as to their colors being orange and blue. It is a political order and was first organized to maintain the Protestant ascendancy in Ireland.

IRISH IN FIGHT

DUBLIN, Aug. 1.—Following Friday's clash at Kilkree, between home-rule and anti-home-rule volunteers, leaders of both factions are using their authority today to keep order.

Home-ruleers were accused of raiding a party of Orangemen in an effort to seize the latter's rifles. Many shots were exchanged. No body was hurt.

A.—K-I-y-o, "Ki" as in "kite" and "Yo" as in "yoke."

A.—Deep breathing and any exercise which promotes deep breathing will increase the chest expansion. Bust developers and bust massage are not to be recommended. Any medicine which will enlarge the glands may some time produce an irritation which will result in disease.

Q.—Please tell me how to make a good cleaning jelly. INEXPERIENCED.

A.—Into 2 quarts of water slice a 5-cent bar of any good white laundry soap and set over the fire to dissolve. Just before removing it from the blaze add 10 cents' worth of salts of tartar. This makes a soft soap that will clean anything from the floors to your finest wool suit. It is an excellent thing to clean bathroom fixtures and sinks with, as it never scratches the surface. It should be thinned with hot water before using.

Q.—I am a married woman and am expecting one or more of my husband's people to visit me in the near future. As I have never seen them, and have been made to feel rather angry with them, I would like to know how to treat them so as to put out their true feelings toward me. I have been told of many slighting remarks that they have made concerning myself. UNDECIDED.
