

MEXICAN WAR TO CONTINUE

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 4.—On behalf of the constitutional army, General Carranza has refused to give guarantees for the safety of the lives and property of the adherents of the defunct Huerta regime, and has also declined to treat further with Provisional President Carbajal's peace delegates.

This decision means the revolution will continue.

Immediately after Carranza's decision was announced, the cabinet went into session to devise means of raising funds for the campaign.

No opposition to any suggestions made by President Carbajal, it was said, will be made.

Secretary of War Velasco issued the following statement today: "We have 35,000 federal soldiers now in Mexico City, and every man will remain loyal to the last."

Through the Brazilian minister, President Wilson urged Carbajal and the provisional cabinet to surrender unconditionally, but Secretary of Foreign Relations Lugan said the government would make armed resistance to any advance by the rebels.

SIGN ARBITRATION PACT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Representatives of Western railroads and their employees and trainmen, signed an agreement today to arbitrate the wage dispute. The arbitrators probably will report their findings January 1.

ESTHER MITCHELL ENDS LIFE

Esther Mitchell committed suicide at Waldport, Ore. She had been married but a few weeks, her new name being Mrs. James N. Berry. Esther Mitchell figured in a murder trial eight years ago. Her brother, George Mitchell, shot and killed "Joshua" Greffield, leader of the Seattle "Holy Rollers," on the ground that Greffield had gained "undue control" over Esther.

The girl killed her brother and was sent to Stellacoom soon after, but was finally released, with a "Holy Roller" as a guardian.

LOAD IS OFF SAM'S MIND

It's all right, Uncle Sam, you can go ahead now and prosper to your heart's content. Full permission was given yesterday by the new Seattle Chamber of Commerce, through W. A. Mears, manager of the transportation bureau, who, in commenting on the advanced rate decision of the Interstate commerce commission, spoke thus:

"The settlement of the question relieves suspense and will tend to a better feeling and more extended business transaction."

MAY WITHDRAW NAMES

Judge Frater has denied the injunction asked by the recallers to prevent the auditor from accepting withdrawals from the recall petitions against Commissioners Hamilton and Knudsen. The court held the supreme court settled the question in a Pierce county case, and withdrawals are permitted up to the time the auditor fixes a day for the election.

FIREMAN BURIED WITH HONORS

Patrick Cooper, fireman, gave up his life in the Grand Trunk Pacific dock fire, but if the love and appreciation shown by his comrades today, if the hundreds of dimmed eyes meant anything, he did not die in vain.

Two hundred and fifty firemen formed the funeral cortege that solemnly wended its way from the fire headquarters, Third av. and Main st., this morning, and proceeded to Fifth av., then to Cherry st., then to Seventh av., to Madison st., to Ninth av., and then to St. James' cathedral. At the head of the procession was the firemen's band, and Fire Chief Stetson marched with the men.

A solemn requiem mass was offered at the cathedral, and the procession moved to Seventh av. and Union st. There the firemen formed two lines, in front of which the hearse and 20 autos, carrying relatives and friends of the hero fireman, passed. The firemen, hats off, bowed their heads low. There were numerous floral offerings. Interment was made at Calvary cemetery. Cooper was 30 years old.

SEATTLE DELEGATES TO GO

The Seattle delegation to the fifth annual convention of the Western Federation of Improvement clubs, comprising the five Pacific Coast states, and which will meet in Tacoma tomorrow, will take the Tacoma boat at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning from the Colman dock.

Three hundred and twenty delegates from the 29 Seattle clubs have already reported. From the present outlook, Seattle will have by far the largest representation in the convention.

HOW BARBER SIZES UP WAR 'LUST FOR LAND CAUSES IT'

We have heard the opinions of the financial man, the professor and the wise ones in general on the European war situation. It now remains for the man in one of the ordinary walks of life to add his views on the subject to the "about the town" discussion and the big mess will be quite explained as far as talk goes.

"I'll be doggoned," said J. R. Lighty, barber, who, as a likable chap, may represent the men in the usual occupations of the town, "I'll be doggoned if I understand what this European war thing is all about. And I've got a hunch there's a lot of other people in the same fix."

"As near as I am able to figure it, this fuss just broke loose over across the pond without much of an excuse for trouble. Those monarchs have been aching to take a crack at one another for years, and now they're at it. I wish 'em all sorts of luck."

"I've got an idea Emperor Wilhelm had been whispering things to his old friend Joseph of Austria, and when Duke Ferdinand was shot the treaty offered a chance to start things. They started them. But at that, I don't believe Austria would go to war solely on account of the death of one duke."

"Everybody in Europe is after more land. The Ferdinand death opened the way for the chance on the part of Germany and Austria. When the other powers saw what was on foot, the big fuss started. One king wouldn't stand idly by while his neighbor monarch was hogging off sections of rich territory for his people and his pride."

"But whatever it all started over, it must be a great sight to see an aeroplane swooping down on a dirigible and the two of them going down to ruin after the crash in the air. These air champs who are pulling those stunts have a high degree of nerve and patriotism."

"Then here's the million men from Germany marching on France and the million Frenchmen coming out to meet them. That ought to make a nice little scrap when they get together. There certainly won't be trees enough to go around. Some one is liable to get hurt in the mixup."

"Let 'em go to it. It had to come, sooner or later. Maybe the war will quiet things down over there and change things around to suit everybody."


